Exchange Teacher

This year at A.C.S., we have the pleasure of having an exchange teacher, Miss Betty Wilmot Davies of Paignton, England. Miss Davies is teaching in the place of Mr. William MacCrea, who is presently at Torquay as an exchange teacher. Both teachers are cooperating through the Committee for the Exchange of Teachers between Great Britain and the United States. This year there are about eighty-five exchanges.

Miss Davies taught at the Audley Parks County Secondary School in Torquay. She is the Art Mistress there, but this year Mr. MacCrea is teaching in her place. There are about twelve hundred and fifty boys and girls between the ages of eleven and sixteen attending the Audley Parks Schools. She feels that the greatest difference between ACS and her school in England is the blocks of class time. In England she would have one particular class for a full morning or afternoon once a week. At ACS she has a class for a short period of time daily.

Miss Davies, who has been teaching for nineteen years, spent two years at Dartington Hall in Devonshire, two years at St. Katharine's College in London and one year at Cardiff College of Education in Cardiff, while earning her diploma.

She comes from Devonshire County which is a noted resort area. Her home is in a coastal town, so she naturally misses the sea. The tourist industry is the main source of income, and a great deal of dairy farming is done there too.

But, she has been forewarned about the winters in Andover and came prepared. Miss Davies is looking forward to doing some skiing and maybe even trying ice skating in the winter.

Upon arrival in New York City, Miss Davies was amazed at the sight of the skyscrapers. This is her first visit to the United States. While spending a few days in New York City she toured the Guggenheim Museum and was very much impressed by it. Then she spent a week of orientation and sight-seeing in Washington, D. C. with the other exchange teachers.

Miss Davies caught the first flight of Andover on August 26. She feels that the people here are charming and delightful and the children are very interesting.

Her favorites among food include chili, hamburgers and she simply loves sweet corn. She has found that Americans eat "a lot of snacks" and also that the British eat more with a knife and fork than Americans do. Hot dogs are usually a favorite of Europeans.

When asked if she felt the two types of teenagers differed any, she said that in England the boys' hair was a little bit longer and the girls' skirts a little shorter. The British students wear uniforms in school, but outside of school the Americans and British dress very much alike.

Her hobbies include painting, making jewelry, playing badminton and working in ceramics. She has organized exchange student groups with a school in Germany where she taught for a month. She has visited France, Italy, Greece, Switzerland, Austria, Holland and Malta.

Miss Davies is the chairman of the Art Teacher's Panel and has acted as Moderator for the South Western Examinations Board for the Certificate of Secondary Education in England. Last year she acted as the examiner. She is also a member of the Devon County Art Teacher's Committee for the purchase of original work of art for the schools in the county.

Miss Davies misses her mother, brother, two sisters, three nephews and one niece very much. However, I am sure that the people of Andover will make her stay here as warm and as happy a memory as any one might have.
