

Local Red Cross Chairman Names Workers

Mrs. James Smith, Andover Red Cross Fall Fund Drive Chairman requested the contributors of Andover to please consider the many diversified services offered by the Red Cross when planning their contribution.

"Residents of the county used 1,118 pints of blood last year, a savings, estimated on the commercial figure of \$50.00 per pint, of \$55,900."

Volunteer ambulance drivers throughout the county have been trained in first aid by Red Cross First Aid Instructors.

1,648 persons passed Red Cross Water Safety course this past year.

A total of 20 families were assisted following fire disasters and 139 cases were given service in the Service to Military and other families program.

These and many other programs are offered by the Allegany County Chapter of American Red Cross. All assistance given is provided by the voluntary contributions of the American people.

The financial requirements of the Allegany County Chapter of American Red Cross this year is the most critical fund raising effort in the chapter since World War II, the increasing number of boys from Allegany County entering the armed forces during the Vietnam War.

We are faced with raising 10% more funds than last year or a total budget of \$22,867.

Our country is at war in Vietnam and there are nearly half a million Americans under arms in Southeast Asia. The American Red Cross, at the request of military commanders, has sent trained staff into Southeast Asia to fulfill its congressional obligation to American military forces.

Maintenance of all Red Cross service is provided by the free gifts of the American people. No fund comes from the Government.

Gunner Mate Third Class Ronald R. Kemp, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Donald R. Kemp of R. 1, Andover, returned to Norfolk Va., September 20th aboard the attack aircraft carrier USS America after an extended deployment with the U. S. Sixth Fleet in the Mediterranean.

During the past eight and one half months the 71,000-ton America has steamed nearly 55,000 miles, participating in exercise with air and naval units of our North Atlantic Treaty Organization allies.

When the America left the U. S. for the Mediterranean, she was the first ship to be attacked by a Soviet aircraft and torpedo boats on June 8. The next day crewmen assisted in transferring wounded Liberty or members to the America and rendering medical aid.

The ship recently added another to her record by winning a Point Efficiency Award for the month of September. The award is presented to the ship which shows the highest efficiency in the highest state of readiness and performance of duty.
