Specialist Urges Farmers To Boost Silage Corn Crop

Commercial dairy farmers in New York State are not growing enough corn for milk cows, though this year's corn crop looked like a record, a Cornell University soil management specialist says.

"The current acreage should be doubled on the basis of one acre of silage corn per milk cow to achieve the best kind of milk production," said Prof. Reeshon Feuer, N.Y. State College of Agriculture at Cornell.

Stressing the need for expansion of silage corn production at the seed, and farm chemical dealers annual meeting of lime, fertilizer, in Syracuse recently, Feuer expressed the hope that this goal be achieved by 1975.

The current state average stands at about half an acre of silage corn per cow, and the milk cow population will be around 1.1 million by 1975. Therefore, he said, the present acreage should be expanded to 1.1 million.

In addition, grain corn production also should be boosted at least five times to cut down on costs of feed purchases, he said, suggesting that growing of half an acre of grain corn per milk cow is desirable. At present, only about 100,000 acres of grain corn are grown on commercial dairy farms, he pointed out.

Watch Your Mail For Car Plate Renewal

If your car registration expires at the end of October, watch the mail for your renewal application. It should arrive during the last two weeks of September or the first two of October. It should be mailed back immediately or taken to the nearest motor vehicle issuing office. Do not mail it after October 13 for it may not be returned before the deadline of mid night, October 31.

Beef Cattlemen Plan Calf Sales

Each fall over 3000 head of beef feeder calves are marketed from the hill country of New York State. These are sold to the corn producers of the state who grow out and "finish" the calves into choice steers and heifers. This fall five sales will be conducted by the Associations of the N. Y. Beef Cattlemen's Association. The "Pike" or Southwestern group will hold their semi-annual sale on Saturday, November 4 at 1 P. M., at the Wyoming County Fairground, in Pike.

Calves to be marketed come from small and large beef herds, must be of beef breeding, properly dehorned or polled, bull calves properly castrated and guaranteed open if heifers. Entry forms and information are available from County Extension Service of offices. County beef directors: Leonard Watson of Belmont, RI No. 1; Harry Cross, Jr., RD No. 1 Bliss; Harold Land, McNess Road Mayville; Walter Bush, RD No. 1 Windfall Road, Olean; Emil Hoffman, Quaker Road, Lawtons; or sale Secretary, C. The number of beef calves sold annually has tripled in the last 15 years. Along with this, corn acreage has also increased on the valley and lake plains farm areas. Other sales this fall will be held on October 26 at Dryden, N. Y., November 1 at Bath and November 3 at Caledonia.

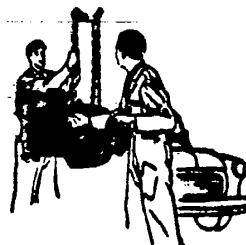
