Governor Requests Federal Aid For Flood Disaster Area

Governor Rockefeller, citing an estimated rain and flood damage in excess of \$5,000,000, urged this week that the Cattaraugus County area be declared by President Johnson as one of "major disaster."

In the aftermath of the September 30 inundation of the area, the Governor, in a telegram Monday to Albert D. O'Connor, Regional Director of the Federal Of

gional Director of the Federal Of-fice of Emergency Planning, re-ported the "severe and extensive damage" and quoted Hughson L. Case, chairman of the Cattaraugus

Case, chairman of the Cattaraugus Boarn of Supervisors as declaring that a state of emergency exists "Accordingly," the Governor said, "I request a presidential declaration of the area as a major disaster area and the cooperation, of your office in ascertaining damage estimates in detail. All appropiate state agencies have been requested to cooperate to the fullest extent. State Civil Defense Director Manuel J. Asensio, has been

"I certify", the Governor continued, "that the total expenditures and obligations by the government of the State of New York, its local governments or other public agencies thereof, over and above normal expenditures, for disaster relief purposes for this disaster and all other disasters during the twelve-month period immediately preceding this request, and for which no feder-1 reimbursement has been or will be received, exceeds \$5.000,000."

Research Promotion Said Vital To Dairy Industry's Survival

Industry's Survival

The dairy industry will cease to be a significant factor in the food industry of the future unless it turns toward new product development and aggressive promotion, a leading Cornell University food scientist says.

Prof. Robert F. Holland, head of the dept. of food science, N. Y. State College of Agriculture, Cornell, said that the industry has set up laws, rules, specifications, and regulations in myriad forms to create monopolies and prevent

to create monopolies and prevent new product development.

to create monopolies and prevent new product develorment.

"But times have a habit of changing and the dairy producer or processor no longer has the legislative voice that he had in the past," he said.

Holland made these remarks while discussing the development of new dairy products, modified products, and substitutes at the 50th annual convention of the National Dairy Council of Canada in Ottawa.

Pointing to what he called "enormous possibilities" for development of new dairy foods, the Cornell scientist said the dairy industry must invest more money in lanoratories, equipment, trained scientists, and promotion.

"The dairy industry is passing through a period of great change" he said. "To survive as an entity, it must be free to adopt the merchandising methods of the food industry and innovate where and when it is essential to meet consumer demands."
