

## School Board Holds Monthly Meeting

The regular meeting of the Board of Education of Andover Central School, was called to order Monday evening by the acting President, Dr. Robert Common. Mr. Kessler and the following Board members were present: Mrs. Mary K. Slade, Conner Stephens and Dr. Robert Common.

Cari Burdick and Alan Tuttle were absent due to circumstances beyond their control.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read for approval. Motion to approve these minutes was made by Mrs. Mary K. Slade, seconded by Conner Stephens, carried by 3 votes of yes.

The Clerks and District Treasurers reports were read for comparison and approval. These reports were moved for approval by Conner Stephens, seconded by Mrs. Mary K. Slade, carried by 3 votes of yes.

The monthly bills for September totalling \$14,476.03 plus utilities, were read for approval by Mr. Kessler. A motion to approve these bills was made by Conner Stephens, seconded by Mrs. Mary K. Slade. Carried by 3 votes of yes.

The Federal bill for September were read for approval. Mrs. Mary K. Slade moved these bills be paid. Seconded by Conner Stephens. Carried by 3 votes of yes.

The Cafeteria bills for the month of September were read for approval, amounting to \$1,372.21. Moved by Conner Stephens, seconded by Mrs. Mary K. Slade. Carried by 3 votes of yes.

The Cafeteria report was read by Mr. Kessler, showing a net loss of \$372.48 for the month of September. This is filed with the minutes.

Motion to adjourn was made by Conner Stephens, seconded by Mrs. Mary K. Slade. Carried by 3 votes of yes.

Relatives report that he was placed in "intensive care" for two days and was able to return to his home on Monday to recuperate with the bandages still remaining on his arms and chest.
