## Tree Planting Encouraged Under ACP

Farmers in Allegany County planted more than 100 thousand trees under the Agricultural Conservation Program during the 1967 tree planting season, according to Stephen Clarke, Chairman Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee.

The chairman explained that tree planting is a long-time investment which ultimately will improve the farmer's income. And in the meantime, the growing trees will provide substantial conservation benefits by helping to reduce erosion and flooding; stabilizing and improving water supplies; assuring clear clean streams; and providing hunting, fishing, and other outdoor recreation opportunities, with farmers a part of the cost.

Under ACP, the public shares of planting trees and of soil, water, woodland, and wildlife conservation measures beyond the extent which farmers could afford to carry out alone. By sharing the cost of such practices, both the farmer and other taxpayers contribute to the improvement and conservation of the Nation's vital natural resources.

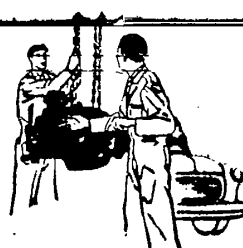

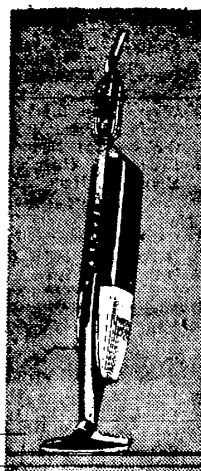
