

School Board Hold Monthly Meeting

The regular meeting of the Board of Education of Andover Central School, was called to order Monday evening by the President, Carl Burdick. Mr. Kessler and the following Board Members were present: Carl Burdick, Alan Tuttle, Mrs. Mary K. Slade, James Smith and Conner Stephens.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read for approval. Motion to approve these minutes was made by Mrs. Mary K. Slade, seconded by Conner Stephens and carried by 5 votes of yes.

The Clerk's and Treasurer's reports were read for approval. A move for approval of these reports was made by Conner Stephens. A second was made by Alan Tuttle, carried by 5 votes of yes.

Motion to approve these was made by Alan Tuttle, and seconded by James Smith. Carried by 5 votes of yes.

A motion to have the board pay for the General Fund, the amount of \$235.47 spent on Federal Grant Title I over the amount received on the grant was made by Mr. Tuttle. Mr. Stephens seconded this and all members voted for it.

Mr. Stephens moved for the approval of the transfer of funds from the General Fund to the Federal Fund to temporarily cover payrolls for the month of December pending arrival of the Federal check. Alan Tuttle seconded this and it was carried by 5 votes of yes.

The monthly bills for the month of November totalling \$6,735.72 plus the gas and electricity were read for the approval by Mr. Kessler. Mrs. Mary K. Slade made the motion to pay these bills and a seconding motion was made by Conner Stephens. Carried by 5 votes of yes.

The cafeteria bills for November were read for approval. These totalling \$1,081.81. A motion to pay these bills was made by Conner Stephens and seconded by James Smith. Total of five approving votes.

The cafeteria report for November was read by Mr. Kessler showing a net gain of \$64.92 with the net loss for the year of \$383.74. A copy of this report is filed with the clerk's report.

Federal Funds Title I, 1967 were read totalling \$15.04. A motion to pay this bill was made by Alan Tuttle, seconded by Conner Stephens. Carried by 5 votes of yes.

Title II, Special Grant, bills for library book were read by Mr. Kessler totalling \$51.32. Alan Tuttle moved to pay these bills with Mrs. Mary K. Slade seconding this motion. Total of five yes votes.

The following people were approved as substitute bus drivers pending passing of the required physical examination: Francis Gavin, Clarence Weatherby, James Mulholland and Robert A. Baker.

Motion for approval was made by Mrs. Mary K. Slade. Seconded by Alan Tuttle and carried by 5 votes of yes.

A motion to adjourn was made by Mrs. Mary K. Slade, and seconded by Alan Tuttle. Carried.

Charles H. Paine, 65, of 1276 W. Marietta St., Decatur, Illinois, died at 5:08 p. m. Saturday in Decatur and Macon County Hospital. He had been ill since 1960.

Mr. Paine was born Feb. 15, 1902 in Andover, N. Y., the son of John F. and Jenny West Paine.

He moved to Decatur from Kenton, Ohio in 1917. He married Lydia Herbrig on Sept. 27, 1923, in Decatur. She survives.

He was a tool and die maker for the Wabash Railroad for 22 years, then worked for the Grigollet Co., until his retirement in 1960.

He was a member of St. John's Lutheran Church.

He leaves one son, Richard C. of Decatur. Two sisters and one brother preceded him in death.

Funeral arrangements were under the Dawson & Wikoff Funeral Home with burial in Graceland Cemetery.

hospitalized two Ag Tech Students.

The car operated by Lloyd B. Preston, RD 3, Hemlock Rd., Albion, N. Y., travelling North on Rt 12, hit a patch of ice, skidded across the road and over-turned after hitting a culvert.

A passenger in the auto, Wayne R. Wagner, RD 3, Horseheads, age 20, received a serious pressed skull fracture and was rushed to St. Mary's Hospital in Rochester after treatment at Hornell.

The operator of the car was issued a summons by State Police for failure to keep right.

At 12:10 a. m. also on County Rd 12, .5 mile North of Route 17 in the Town of Wellsville, investigated by Troopers C. J. McCole, and G. Herberger, who responded to the call for the above accident as well, two Wellsville youths were killed instantly when their car hit a tree.

According to the report, the car operated by William Shelly Jr., 21, of 134 Rauber St., Wellsville ran off the road, travelled 199 feet along the shoulder, and then struck a tree head-on.

Joel Solbeck, 21, a passenger in the car, residing at 46 North Broad St., was thrown from the car by the terrific impact which practically tore the car apart.

Both men were pronounced dead by Dr. Edwin Comstock, Allegany County Coroner.

In another 1 car accident at 1:30 a. m. investigated by State Police from the Bath Sub-Station, an Alfred Student was killed and two others injured when their car left the road, sideswiped two trees and crashed into a utility pole.

According to the report, David J. King, owner and operator of the car from Lyons, N. Y., lost control while travelling West on Route 21 in Steuben County enroute to Alfred, went off the South edge of the highway, sideswiped two trees and hit a utility pole. He was pronounced Dead On Arrival at the Hospital.

Donald Barber, 19, a passenger from Hilltop Rd., Ithaca, N. Y., suffered multiple bruises and shock.

Another passenger Mr. Forrester, age 21, from Cambell, N. Y., is in serious condition with a fracture of the right leg, internal injuries and lacerations to the head.

High School Seniors Please Take Note

Headquarters First United States Army, Fort George G. Meade, Maryland — January 15, 1968 is the deadline date for submission of completed Army Reserve Officer Training Corps (ROTC) scholarship applications. Young men who are currently high school seniors are eligible to apply for one of the 800 four-year scholarships.

The scholarships will be valid next fall at any of 247 colleges and universities offering Army ROTC. The successful applicant will receive full cost of tuition, textbooks and laboratory fees plus \$50 a month living allowance for four years.

Awards will be based primarily on scholastic standing, physical qualifications and leadership potential.

Local Nursery Awarded Contract

Governor Rockefeller has announced the award of a contract for \$53,885 to Genesee Valley Nurseries Inc., Wellsville, N. Y., for landscaping and other improvements to the Routes 14 and 36 interchange in the Town of Phelps, Ontario County. The firm submitted the lower of two bids to the State Department of Transportation.

Trees and shrubs will be planted, slopes seeded for erosion control, cable guide railing installed for 770 feet, and sections of fence erected.

Scheduled for completion by December 18, 1968, all work will be under the supervision of Bernard F. Perry engineer in charge of the Department of Transportation District Office at Rochester.
