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#### State Ed. Dept. Designs Measuring Instruments For Performing Arts Ed.

New York State's unprecedented venture into performing arts education, which already has reached more than one million students in secondary schools, is looking for yardsticks by which to measure the quality of the

program.

The launching of a study of develop evaluation instruments had been announced by Dr. Walter Crewson, Associate Commissioner for Elementary, Secondary, and Continuing Education of the State Education Department.

Commissioner Crewson pointed
out that the integration of performing arts into the regular
school curriculum is so new in
education that no known evaluating instruments exist which specifically apply "In evolving such
instruments," he said, "the State
Education Department will have
the close assistance of two research specialists from the United
States Office of Education — Miss
Kathryn Bloom and Junius Eddy".

When completed, the guides will
be incorporated into the Education
Department's Cooperative Review
Service, to enable school districts
to evaluate their own programs in
performing arts education.

In essence, he explained, an evaluation instrument is a set of criteria for judging the effectiveness of an instructional procedure. The Department has two immediate goals in mind: an instrument for measuring the impact of performing arts on the students; another for schools to measure their own achievements in the new field. It is felt that a totally new kind own achievements in the first lit is felt that a totally new kind of evaluation method will need to be developed to measure pupil growth in appreciation of


