Changes In Postal Rates Which Went Into Effect Last Sunday, Jan. 7, 1968

The revised Postal Regulations for the Domestic Postage Rates and Mail Classification have been received and some corrections will be noted:

First Class Mail?

First Class Mail.

Letter Rate: The first class rate will be increased to 6 cents per ounce or fraction of an ounce for pieces weighing 13 ounces or less. Pieces weighing over 13 ounces will be subject to the air parcel pust rates, and shall be entitled to the most expenditious handling and transportation practicable.

Card Rate:

The rate for postal and post cards will be increased to 5 cents. Air Post Cards will be 8 cents DROP LETTERS:

THE SPECIAL RATE FOR DROP LETTERS WILL BE ELIMINATED.— (THIS MAIL CONSISTS OF LOCAL MAIL PUT IN THE POST OFFICE AND UNSFALED BOXES, AND UNSEALED GREETING CARDS.) Drop letters will no longer be subject to a rate lower than the regular rate.

Bills and Statements of Ac-

counts:
All bills and statement of account regardless of the method of preparation or quantity of identical pieces mailed will be subject to the First Class Rate.

Weight and Size Limits:

The limits of weight and size for first class mail will be 70 rounds and 100 inches length and

Second Class Mail (Newspapers and Magazines) 5 cents for the first two ounces and 1 cent for each additional ounce.

Third Class Mail (Printed Mat ter and Catalogues) less than 1 pound 6 cents for the first 2 ounces and 2 cents for each ad-ditional ounce.

Airmail:

Rates for ailmail weighing 7 ounces and under will be increased o 10 cents per ounce or fraction Airmail weighing over the airman weighing over the Touries is subject to the air parcel post rates. Air parcel post rates in the 5 pointd and under weight range are charged. They will be amputed by zone in ½ pound weight in rements.

If Your Sticker Is Green You'd Bener Stop!

Is the inspection sticker on your car a green one?

If it is, you'll be in trouble if you do not have your car inspected immediately, according to the State Department of Motor Vehicles.

spected immediately, according to the State Department of Motor Vehicles.

The sticker, which proves that your car has been safety inspected, must show that this has been done within the past 12 months. in color, this indicates that your car-was last inspected in 1966 and that you are in violation of the periodic inspection law. Violators are subject to a fine and possible suspension of registration certificate and plates.

Beginning last January 1, 1967 the sticker color was changed to red and the position was shifted to the upper center of the wind-shield. Beginning this month, inspection stations are issuing blue stickers that are located on the lower left side of the windshield. The 1967 and 1968 stickers have a punched out hole which Indicates when the next inspection is due.
