William P. Dougherty Named Principal Of Elmira Heights School

William P. Dougherty of 107 Oakwood Ave., Elmira Heights, was named principal Monday night January 8, of a school being built practically in his backyard.

Dougherty, assistant principal of Edison Junior - Senior High School since 1965, will become principal of the projected elementary - junior high school being built west of Oakwood Ave. and just south of W. Eighth St.

The rear property line of Mr. Dougherty's home abuts the school site. He was appointed to the position by the Elmira Heights Board of Education Monday night effective when the new school is completed.

His starting salary will be \$13,128 per year.

Mr. Dougherty, son of Mr. and Mrs. A. L. Dougherty, Andover, is a native of Andover, N. Y., received his bachelor's degree from Alfred University in 1950, taught for one year at Friendship, N. Y., and then spent two years in the Army Military Intelligence Corps.

He joined the Elmira Heights system in 1953, spending three years as a social studies teacher

at Edison and nine years as a guidance counselor. He was appointed to his present post in 1955 and has served as assistant principal and principal — for two years each — of Chemung County Summer High School.

Dougherty received a master's degree from Alfred University in 1956 and has accumulated 30 additional hours of graduate credit in administrative courses at Syracuse University since then.

He is married to the former Mary McCarthy of Addison and the father of three children. His wife formerly was a teacher at Hendy Ave., School. For the past year, Dougherty has been president of Elmira Heights Kiwanis Club.
