Where And How The Legislature Can Get \$181,000,000

The state tax on beer has not been raised since it was imposed in 1934 at the rate of 3½ cents per gallon. It has been the same for 35 years, while state, federal, and local taxes on almost every vital commodity and property have risen untold times.

How has beer escaped?

According to the state Liquor
Authority, New Yorkers consumed
339,900,239 gallons of beer in
1966. Figuring at eight pounds
to the gallon, or 128 ounces to the
gallon, you have quite a few billion bottles or glasses of the 12
ounce, standard variety.

A few years ago the legislature
put a 5c per pack additional tax
on cigarettes. Consumption went
up, not down.

on cirarettes. Consumption went up, not down.

Now, if the legislature put a 5c additional tax per 12 ounce bottle of beer, which costs about the same as a pack of cigarettes, the state of New York would receive \$181,280,126.90 in new revenue hased on the 1966 beer consumption. Not a bad figure from a luxury item.

And only fair. In some counties sales taxes on essential items are already 5% and raising. State tax on gasoline is 6c per gallon. federal, four cents. Beer is classed as a food and not taxed at all.
