Harry Lewis Baker of Maple Street, died in the Bethesda Community Hospital, North Hornell, on Tuesday afternoon February 6, 1968, following a brief illness. He was 74.

Mr. Baker was born in the Town of Wellsville Jan. 3, 1894, son of Henry and Caroline Meyers Baker. He had been engaged in farming most of his life. After retiring from farming in 1952, he was employed by Ford & Peckham of Andover for several years.

Mr. Baker was a member of the Andover Presbyterian Church, Andover Grange No. 1098, and Andover Masonic Lodge No. 558, F. & A. M.

Surviving are a daughter, Mrs. Dorothy Schultheis of Arkport; two sons, Robert D. Baker and H. Richard Baker both of Andover; 12 grandchildren; two sisters, Mrs. Mary Dennison of Hornell and Mrs. Helen Cleveland of Buffalo; and several nieces and nephews. His wife, Augusta Lewis Baker died in 1961.
