At the regular meeting of Andover Grange No. 1098 to be held Wednesday evening, February 14, the 1968 Doughnut Contest, sponsored by the American Agriculturist and New York State Grange, will be held. Following are the rules for the Contest:

RULES

Contest details will be handled by the New York State Grange Service and Hospitality Committee, assisted by Chairmen of Pomona and Subordinate Grange S. and H. Committees. The chairmen will secure competent judges.

1. Each contestant must be a member of a New York State Subordinate Grange. All Grange members (men and women) are eligible, with the exception of those who are professional bakers.

2. Each contestant will enter five (5) round, plain doughnuts with hole in center, approximately

3 inches in diameter. Doughnuts to be of the quick bread-type dough, made with baking powder and/or baking soda (no yeast). No fancy shapes; no nuts or fillings. No glazing, coating or frosting. Doughnuts made from a mix are NOT eligible for this contest.

2. The winner of each Subordinate Grange Contest is to compete with other Subordinate Grange winners, and the Pomona Contest winners are to compete together in the finals at State Grange Annual Session next fall. All entries become the property of the Grange to be used as desired following the judging.
