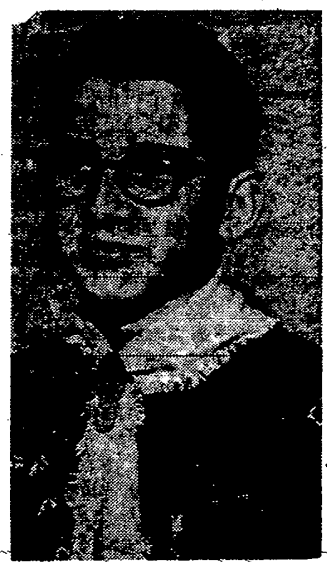

## "Andy" Gram Honored at Career Day Program

Eagle Scout Charles "Andy" Gram of Troop 42, Andover, was among 22 New Eagle Scouts of Seneca Council that were honored at an impressive "Eagle Career Day" ceremony held last Thursday at the Olean High School.

The program began in the afternoon when the Eagle Scouts conferred with 16 prominent businessmen in as many careers. "Andy's" sponsor, Dr. John Neenan of the Space Engineering program at St. Bonaventure University, conferred with him on this program, giving him a glimpse of the opportunity available to qualified young men, as well as showing him the facilities available at the school.

The Eagle Scouts then attended the dinner with their sponsors which was held at the Olean High School cafeteria for around 100 guests.

The evening program was opened by a candlelighting ceremony which depicted the Scout beliefs and aspirations.

Larry Weise, basketball coach from St. Bonaventure University, main speaker of the evening, saluted the honored young men and commended their attitude of responsibility and self-reliance, saying that these qualities created "courage to overcome life's obstacles."

Coach Weise said "Scouting is good preparation for life and for athletics," and called "Scouting education with fun."

Eagle Scout James Underwood Jr., a Syracuse University student, then showed breathtaking colored slides and told of his climb last summer to the 20,000-foot peak of Mt. McKinley in Alaska which is the highest in North America.

Each Eagle Scout was presented an American Legion Citizenship Certificate by Craig Snyder, Andover, chairman of the Boy Scout Committee of the Allegany County American Legion, and Claude Norcross, Bradford, chairman of the Boy Scout Committee of the Cattaraugus County American Legion. The same Eagle Scouts were also presented an American Flag by Clifford Williams, representative of the Olean Elk Lodge.

All of the Eagle Scouts can certainly take pride in their achievements since it was brought out during the program that only one out of 100 Boy Scouts across the country make it to Eagle Rank, highest in the organization.
