

With the gun registration battle looming up in the near future — and while it is still fresh in our minds here is something that we recently ran across and think is worth repeating. The title is:

Registration Hasn't Slowed Car Thefts!

"Some vocal Americans who hate and fear guns continue to demand that all firearms be regdemand that all firearms be registered. Many of these people belong to nation-wide church groups, and, these good people, nearly all of whom are far more remote from the crime problem than the patrolman on his beat or the lone woman walking home after dark, urge what seems to them to be so logical.

'Cars are registered, they or:

'Cars are registered, they cry, so why act guns?'
So, let us look at what car registration and related laws have done to control machines which, according to the best official reports, killed nearly 8 times as many Americans last year — as guns, and at a death rate that is slimbing a fatter as guns.

guns, and at a death rate that is climbing 4 times as fast as gun fatalaties!

What do we find?—Every State in the Union requires every car to be registered by ownership and tagged with a number — in the back, and usually in the front also.

Federal laws passed in 1948 impose stiff penalties of up to 5 years and \$5,000 for sneaking a

years and \$5,000 for sneaking a stolen car across State lines or concealing it thereafter.

Thus, what we have in the form of State car registration and Federal automotive law, closely resembles what the anti-gun spokesmen advocate for firearms: State registration in every State and a Federal law to control interstate trafic

'If anti-gun spokesmen argue that you can't compare the Federal law on cars with the Federal gun law they want "left it be noted that they are the ones who demand that guns be registered 'just the way that cars are". Furthermore, they are the ones the possible pos Furthermore, they are the ones who persist in closing their eyes to the one big difference between a car and a gun. A car is a lot larger and harder to steal and concent — than a firearm. Yet, Red and lows seainst car theft, even coupled with State registration, appear to have failed dis-
