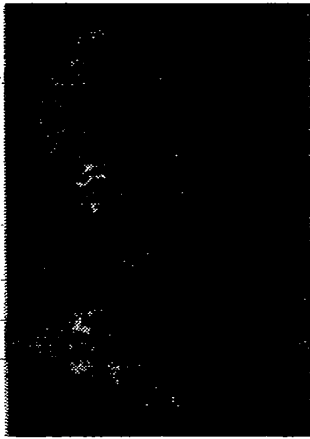
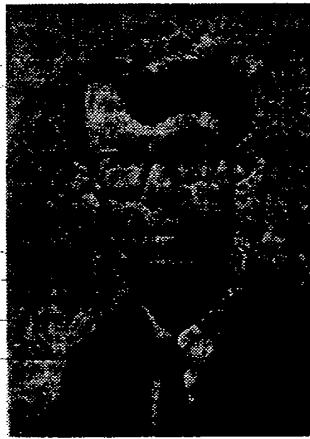

Mary Ellen Corwin

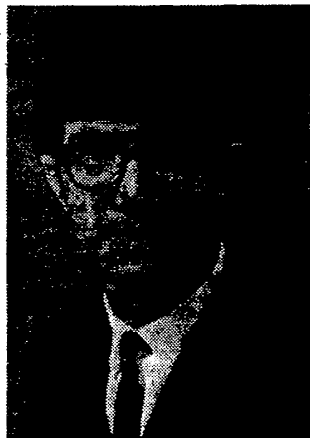

## Two Receive Alternates

From a graduating class of forty-four, five Seniors have won New York State Regents Scholarships or are alternates.

The New York State Education Department has announced the names of those high school pupils who have won Regents Scholarships this year. The holder of one of these scholarships will be entitled to an annual award of \$250 to \$1,000 depending on financial need for each of four years of his college course while attending any college in the State of New York approved by the Regents for this purpose. In addition, scholarship holders may be eligible to receive scholar incentive awards of \$100 to \$500 up to the cost of tuition depending on the family income.

The three students who have been named as receiving scholarships are Roger Barnes, Mary Ellen Corwin and Charles Joyce. The students who were listed as alternates are Rose Mary Baker and Dale Polmateer.

Roger Barnes is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Clayton Barnes. He will pursue a course in Art Education at the State University of New York at New Paltz or at Alfred University.

Mary Ellen Corwin the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Corwin, plans to study Political Science at Albany State of the University of Rochester.

Charles Joyce, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Joyce, has plans for studying pre-law at the John Carroll University at Cleveland, Ohio, where he has been accepted.

Incidentally folks, we have read about the LSD problem, formed our own opinions, and figured that almost every one but the "Kooks" agreed with us. However, in a discussion this past week-end, we found that quite a few people don't know just what to think about the situation. Thus when we ran across the following article written by a well-known and reliable pharmacist we thought that the least we could do was pass it along to you folks for consideration. So here it is: "The person who abuses drugs tends to be child-like in personality, dependent, unable or unwilling to make realistic decisions and reluctant to grow up."

Psychedelic recruiters may stress new sensations of color and sound, a sense of love, and expanded creativity, but court and medical records show otherwise.

Any use of LSD, known as acid, is potentially far more dangerous than misuse of amphetamines and barbiturates, according to present research. Its effects may last beyond the present generation unless steps are taken to halt its use.

LSD is not distributed legally! No doctor can prescribe it and no pharmacists can sell it. Most Street supplies are illegally produced often under unsanitary conditions. A "trip", usually initiated by a non-taker of the drug to prevent the user from coming to harm, may or may not lead to a safe return. A "bum trip" can increasingly lead to the psychiatric ward or to a long period of hospitalization.

In its pure state, LSD is colorless, tasteless, and one of the most powerful drugs known. Often it is bulked for sale with other substances. At the present time it has no known medical application, although scholars have speculated that it might eventually help in treating alcoholics and in alleviating the pain of terminal patients.

The drug produces hallucinations by crossing the sensory circuits so that sounds may appear as color, images may distort, and unreal landscapes may appear. Unfortunately, a round-trip is not guaranteed! Some users find it

a one-way journey. A trip to the land of no return can leave the user imprisoned in a nightmare, dependent and maimed.

Extensive hospitalization is often required. Abnormal brain waves that are recorded under LSD use — may persist. An additional danger is the "afterflash", LSD's ability to take the user on an unexpected trip six months or a year after original use. When the hallucination recurs under unexpected conditions, dangers may increase.

Recent medical evidence also shows that chromosome damage may result. Genetic effects — which may appear in the user's future children — also are causing serious worry to researchers who are conducting animal tests — as well as tests on confirmed LSD users.

Law enforcement officials also point out additional hazards that hover over the LSD user — delinquency, assault, robbery for the purpose of securing drug funds, highway accidents and arrests for drug distribution.

LSD and some of its new cousins are more potent than strychnine and cyanide. If young and old know the odds, they will join in a concerted effort to hold back these forces.

And to this we add: "Amen!"
