Carried unanimously. The Clerk then cast one ballot for John Murray, Harold Rice and James Earl Burgess as the Republican Village Committee to Fill Vacancy.

The history of Scouting was then traced back to its beginning on Feb. 8, 1910 in the United States with President Taft being the first honorary President. In 1914 the First Boy Scout Sunday and National Boy Scout Week was held. In 1917, with the slogan "Help win the War", Boy Scouts sold 2,500,000 Liberty Bonds worth \$147,876,962 and over \$53,000,000 worth of savings stamps.

In 1929, after a thorough study of the Cub Scout Program, the first experimental packs were formed. In 1933 the Cub Scout Program was well under way with several thousand members signed up by the end of the year. Today there are more than 1,500,000 Cub Scouts in the program that is growing each year.

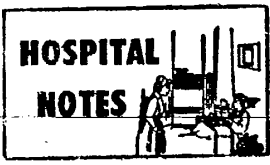
WOLF — Edward Joyce, and Mark Clark, who also won the Gold Arrow.
