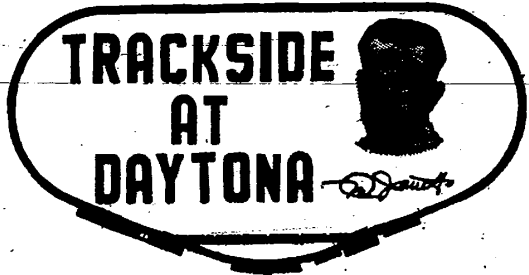

Well racing fans, The 1968 Daytona 500 is now a thing of the past and, despite the fact that the cars were "hotter than ever" this year, the average speed for the race was over 10 miles per hour slower than the record held by Richard Petty, set in 1964 at 154.334 mph with his Plymouth. This was due to the many accidents that marred the race which caused the caution flag to be thrown 11 different times for a total of 60 laps. Also, although 9 cars were wrecked and forced out of the race at speeds between 170 and 190 mph, the safety specifications were at such a high level — that no one was seriously hurt — and only 2 drivers even needed to be taken to the hospital for a check-up!

We would have given an eye-tooth to have been able to have covered this "big-one" at "trackside" however we had to settle for 3rd best and listened to it on the radio.

In looking over the statistics of the race of the top 11 places: 3 of the 6 Mercurys entered in the race were in this group; 3 of the 5 Plymouths entered in the race; 2 of the 17 Fords; and 3 of the 12 Dodges. Two Mercurys were wrecked, 3 Fords, 3 Dodges, and 1 Plymouth. In fact, two of the top contenders were taken out in one spectacular crash when Mario Andretti, No. 11, last year's winner, spun out with his '68 Mercury on a curve directly in front of Buddy Baker's '68 Dodge Charger — and the resulting crash took both cars out. Prior to this crash, Buddy, driving No. 3, had settled the pre-race question of whether the '68 Dodge Charger could stay with the "Mercurys", "Fords", and "Plymouths" by swinging out and taking the 3 leaders on a straight stretch — and then holding the lead for a total of 20 laps until one of the lapped cars brushed him as he went by and he had to

swing into the pits for a quick check-up by his pit-crew.

Richard Petty, No. 43, and Paul Goldsmith, No. 99, both driving '68 Plymouths, ran into the same kind of bad luck as flying debris from a "blown motor" cracked their windshields forcing them to slow down to keep their glass from completely disintegrating and taking them out of the race completely.

For a brief re-cap: Cale Yarborough No. 21, driving a '68 Merc came in first after passing LeeRoy Yarborough, No. 26, in another '68 Merc, with just 3 laps to go — with just a few car lengths separating the two cars when they crossed the finish line. Bobby Allison, No. 29, in a '68 Ford was 3rd; Al Unser, No. 6, was 4th; David Pearson, No. 17, in a '68 Ford was 5th; Paul Goldsmith, No. 99, driving his '68 Plymouth was 6th; Darel Dieringer, No. 22, in another '68 Plymouth was right behind him for 7th place; Richard Petty, No. 43, in his '68 Plymouth "Road-Runner" was 8th; Tiny Lund, No. 16, in a '68 Merc was 9th; and Hampton, No. 32, in a '67 Dodge was 10th; and Bob Pronger, No. 67, with his '67 Dodge was 11th. A. J. Fovt, No. 27, had to drop out with his '68 Ford in the 183rd lap with transmission trouble and placed 12th although his car wasn't running when the race ended.

Altogether there were 22 lead changes among 9 drivers. Cale Yarborough, No. 21, '68 Merc, led 76 laps; LeeRoy Yarborough, No. 26, '68 Merc, led 62 laps; Buddy Baker, No. 3, '68 Dodge Charger, led 20 laps; Mario Andretti, No. 11, '68 Merc, led 17 laps; David Pearson, No. 17, '68 Ford, led for 10 laps; Bobby Allison, No. 29, '68 Ford, 7 laps; Richard Petty, No. 43, '68 Plymouth, 4 laps; Butch Hartman No. 5, '68 Dodge, 3 laps; and Al Unser, No. 6, '68 Dodge, 1 lap.
