

**Andover Methodist Church To Host Missionerama**

The Rev. Ole E. Borgen, Norwegian Methodist ecumenical and youth leader, pastor and politician, will speak at the third Wellsville area Missionerama for the 12 Methodist churches of the district. The meeting will be held this Thursday, Feb. 29, at 7:30 p. m. at the Andover Methodist Church.

Mr. Borgen is administrative assistant to Bishop Odd Hagen, bishop of the Northern Europe Area and president of the World Methodist Council. He travels extensively, preaching, speaking at schools and youth meetings and lecturing on theology and church life. He is also the author of *John Wesley, the Man and His Thought*, published in Holland in 1966.

While in the United States, Mr. Borgen will explain the Advance giving program in northern Europe. Funds are being raised for churches, schools and youth centers in Finland, Sweden, Norway and Denmark.

A native of Lillestrom, Norway, Mr. Borgen received his university education in the United States. He was graduated from Greensboro College, Greensboro, N. C., with a bachelor of arts degree in 1959 and from Duke Divinity School, Durham, N. C., with a bachelor of divinity degree in 1962. He is completing work on a doctor of philosophy degree at Drew University, Madison, N. J.

After completing his divinity studies at Duke, Mr. Borgen was pastor of the West Side Avenue Church, Jersey City, N. J. On his return to Norway, he assumed leadership positions in the Norway Conference. He also served on the Lillestrom City Council and its Board of Managers and was group leader for the Christian Peoples Party.

Following Mr. Borgen's address Thursday night, the local W.S.C.S. will serve refreshments. The service is open to the public.

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**Presbyterian Church To Host "Lamplighters" Monday March 4**

Powerful motets and chorales, traditional songs of the Church and refreshing contemporary works will be included in the program which the Waynesburg College Lamplighters from Waynesburg, Pennsylvania, will present March 4th at 8:00 p. m. in the Andover Presbyterian Church.

Prof. James D. Randolph, director of the 30-voice choir, will open up the program, "A History of Creative Worship through Music and the spoken Word", with "Hodie Christus", a chant from Ceremony of Carol by B. Britten. This will be followed by an example of a primitive music, the Kyrie from the African Mass as arranged by Norman Luboff.

The next work illustrates the development of hymns through the singing of the "Old Hundredth". Included in this group will be an antiphonal psalm, as arranged by H. Pfohl, and a canon in imitation, "All Praise to Thee", as arranged by T. Tallis.

The next hymns are by some of the greatest men in music. The Aria from "The suite in D Major" is an example of polyphony. A is the stirring arrangement of "A selection from the Reformation Mighty Fortress Is Our God" by Martin Luther. The "Alleluia" by Mozart and "He Watching Over Israel" by Mendelssohn will be offered by the choir as examples of church music by the great masters, and will conclude the first half of their program, "One generation shall praise Thy works to another."

"Sing unto the Lord a new song" typifies the music to be presented in the second half of the service. The choir will begin with a Mormon hymn, "Come, Come Ye Saints," arranged by J. S. Cornwell.

This will be followed by "Hosodi Pomilui" (Lord Have Mercy), a Russian Orthodox hymn as arranged by A. VonLvov. The Jewish psalmody is represented in the selection "Vorech cho."

The next hymns to be presented are examples of Southern Folk Hymns: "Wondrous Love" by Shaw-Parker and "Life's Railway to Heaven" by C. D. Tillman. These will be followed by "Ain-a

"There is some exciting fishing ahead in New York State," said Conservation Commissioner R. Stewart Kilborne. His prediction was a very safe one for he made it as he stocked the first coho salmon in New York State waters. "The coho — one of the Pacific Salmon — is a fine fighting fish with a tremendous growth rate. Moreover, even though a marine fish it thrives in large cold lakes," the Commissioner continued.

New York State's welcome visitors were stocked in Cattaraugus Creek, a tributary of Lake Erie. Although this first experimental stocking was a modest one — 6,000 fish — it marked an important step toward providing outstanding fishing in one of the largest bodies of water available to New York State anglers.

Professional conservationists, sport fishermen and commercial fishermen will follow the progress of these fish with considerable interest. The State of Michigan has enjoyed an outstanding success with its coho salmon stocking of Lake Michigan.

Conservation Department fish biologists explained that the coho salmon are a school of fish that grow and mature at a great rate. Their feeding habits and choice of habitat make them ideal for stocking in Great Lake waters.

The newly stocked fish were brought to the stocking location from the New York State Fish Hatchery at Caledonia. The 18-month-old cohos were between five and six inches in length. They are expected to reach five or six pounds by fall of 1969 with a possibility for reaching as much as 25 to 30 pounds.

**Waste Outlet Forms Sent Out To Industries**

The State Health Department has announced the start of a survey of some 20,000 municipal and industrial waste outlets in New York State.

Waste outlet pre-registration forms have been mailed to 17,000 known industries and 1,650 municipalities to gather information on all facilities discharging wastes into the waters of the State.

The pre-registration forms include questions about the nature of the wastes, whether discharged through a municipal sewer system or otherwise, the number of separate outlets discharging into the surface of the water, the average water use in gallons per day, the volume and method of disposing of solid wastes, and whether or not such disposal is handled by plant personnel or by private contractors.

The forms, returnable in ten days after their receipt, will be reviewed and regular registration forms provided for each waste outlet into the waters of the State.

Such registration, required under Chapter 595 of the Laws of 1966, will provide an inventory of all waste streams and a background on potential pollutional discharges.



**Air Pollution Law Now In Effect**

A new State air pollution rule, effective as of Feb. 6, 1968, prohibits the idling of bus and truck engines for more than three minutes unless the vehicle is stopped in traffic or the engine must be idled to keep passengers warm.

The rule was announced by Dr. Hollis S. Ingraham, state health commissioner and chairman of the state Air Pollution Control Board.

"No diesel engine which produces motive power in a bus or truck shall be allowed to idle more than three consecutive minutes when the bus is not in motion."

The rule will not apply: "When a vehicle is forced to remain motionless because of traffic conditions over which the operator has no control," and

"When regulations adopted by federal state or local agencies having jurisdiction require the maintenance of a specific temperature for passenger comfort." In such a case, idling will be permitted, "but only to the extent necessary to comply with such regulations."

The idling restriction amends an air pollution rule enacted Aug. 10, 1967, which prohibits the operation for more than five seconds of a diesel engine emitting smoke which "will reduce transmission of light by more than 20 per cent."

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
