The Rev. Richard V. Bergren, Jr., will resign as minister of The Union University Church in Alfred, next September to begin graduate study for the Ph.D. degree. He has been appointed a full-time instructor in philosophy and religion at Alfred University, effective in the fall of 1968. After two years on leave at Duke University, he will begin teaching duties as a member of the University's philosophy department in the fall of 1970.

Servicemen - Viet Nam

Servicemen serving in Viet Nam have an automatic extension of time to file their 1967 Federal income tax returns, District Director John E. Foley of the Buffalo Internal Revenue Service pointed out.

Their returns will not be due until 180 days after they leave Viet Nam or if they were hospitalized outside the United States as a result of such service the return is

due 180 days after release from the hospital, whichever is later. This extension is available to the wife of the serviceman wishing to file a joint return, but not for filing a separate return.

If the wife of a serviceman in Viet Nam decides to prepare a separate return, it must be filed on or before April 15, 1968.

However, if she decides to file a joint return on or before April 15, 1968 while her husband is with the Armed Forces in Viet Nam, his signature is not needed on the joint return. The wife should sign, and also indicate in the space provided for her husband's signature, that he is with the U. S. Armed Forces in Viet Nam.
