**Red Cross Blood Donors Note Eligibility Change**

Wesley Parish, Allegany County Red Cross Blood Program Chairman has announced that several changes have been made recently concerning donor eligibility. They are as follows:

1. A donor may give blood up to his 61st birthday, rather than his 60th.
2. The New York State law now permits a donor to give 5 times in a 12 month period. Eight weeks must elapse between donations.
3. Women are ineligible as donors during pregnancy and for 6 months after delivery.
4. A person having had infectious jaundice, hepatitis, or malaria cannot be accepted for donations.
5. If a donor has taken anti malarial drugs he is deferred for a period of two years from the time of the last medication.

**Worthington Corp. To Start O.-J.-I.**

Governor Rockefeller has announced that the State Labor Department's Division of Manpower has developed an on-the-job training program under the State Manpower Training Act to train 45 persons at an Allegany County firm in skilled occupations. All will be hired from the ranks of the unemployed.

The Worthington Corporation, Turbine Division of Wellsville, will train 45 persons as production machine operators. Workers will receive instruction in the operation of lathes, milling machines, drill presses, boring mills and cylindrical grinders during a 26-week period.

Trainees will be recruited for the project with the assistance of the State Employment Service, an arm of the Labor Department's Division of Employment.

Under the State Manpower Training Act, the State will reimburse the company a total of \$22,857 as a portion of the total training cost. The firm assumes the remainder of the training cost, including trainee wages.

**Red Cross Chairman Issues SOS**

H. Alfred Brush, Chapter Chairman of the Allegany County Chapter of American Red Cross, issued an SOS to residents of the county. "This SOS stands for Serve our Servicemen," Mr. Brush said. The County chapter is faced with a \$2,719 deficit in the annual fall fund campaign, and this amount must be raised if we are to continue to give our services.

In making his announcement Mr. Brush said that the volunteer Board of Directors of the chapter had reviewed the budget and noted only one service which could be discontinued to make up this deficit, that of the blood program. It is with the opinion of the Board that this program is too vital to the residents of the county. "Help us help to Serve our Servicemen by making a contribution to the Allegany County Chapter, American Red Cross, Community Building, Wellsville, New York, 'Today'," Mr. Brush said.
