Village Board Sees Spirited Session

The regular monthly Village
Board Meeting turned into a
rather "spirited session" on several occasions when visitors discussed their bunness pro-and-con
with Mayor Kilbane and other
Village Board Meanlers.

After the reading of the minutes of the previous meeting, Chief
of Police Ray Witter gave his report, which can be found elsewhere in this week's issue of the
Andover News.

Mr. and Mrs. Finley McCoubrey,
who are having a new home built
on "Pond Hill" (Hardy Hill), requested that action be taken on
their written request for an itemized bill which had been sent to
the Village Board in the middle of
November. The bill that they had
been initially rendered for around
\$1,472 (of which they were to
pay half) was rather "loosley"
drawn up and had items like:
Harris Suppley Co. — supplies—
\$331.00 (no indication of what
this included); Supplies from
stock—\$49.82 (ditto); Rental of
Backhoe—\$345 (no rate per hour
or number of hours used); Portable Welder—\$78.60; etc., which
had resulted in their request for
an itemized bill so they would
know what these items were and
their individual charge.

Mr. McCoubrey also brought out
the fact that he had requested that
a 4 inch line be run, instead of the

Mr. McCoubrey also brought out the fact that he had requested that a 4 inch line be run, instead of the 3 inch that was installed—on advice of the Fire Underwriters Board. He was told that the cost of putting in a 4 inch line would have been prohibitive due to the size of equipment that would have been necessary to use. He also asked if it was customary to hold a check from November until February before depositing it since his check for water service from the curb box to his house had received that fate. Mayor Kilbane replied: "No, only in a case like this."

Finally, after a few minutes search, itemized bills were produced from Village files on this project and Mayor Kilbane promised that copies would be made and mailed to the new Andover Taxpayers.

Mr. Kessler, Supervising Principal of Andover Central School, then discussed proposed electric rates for a new contract to be entracted to be entracted. rates for a new contract to be entered upon between the School and the Village for the purchase of electrical energy. Mayor Kilbane stated that any agreement in rates was subject to the approval of the Power Authority, so a tentative rate schedule was drawn up and is to be sent them in the near future.

Reports were then given by the Reports were then given by the Relectric Department, and Streets and Water Department explaining briefly what activities had envolved in those departments in the past month.

A discussion was then held on the proposed hours for the Village Dump to be open under paid supervision on as an economical basis as possible with the following realistic hours finally agreed on. Sunday from 10 until 12, and again from 1 until 4; Wednesday afternoon from 1 until 5; Friday afternoon from 1 until 6; and Saturday from 9 until 12, and again from 1 until 5. It was felt that this took every shift possible into consideration and also gave

that this took every shift possible into consideration and also gave the "week-end" gardeners and handy-men their opportunity.

The proposed tentative budget was then discussed at length and arrangements were made to have a public hearing on the Village Budget on Tuesday evening, April 9th at 8:00 p. m.

partial tax exemption of ireal property owned by certain persons with limited income who are sixty-five years of age or over.

Resolution by Andover Central School District No. 1, Towns of Andover, Alfred, Wellsville, Independence and Ward, Allegany County, and Greenwood, Steuben County, as follows:

Section 1. The purpose of this resolution is to grant a partial exemption from taxation to the extent of fifty per centum of the assessed valuation of real property which is owned by certain persons with limited income who are sixty-five years of age or over meeting the requirements set forth in section four hundred sixty-seven of the Real Property Tax Law.

Section 2 Real property owned by nersons sixty-five years of age or over shall be exempt from school taxes to the extent of fifty

school taxes to the extent of fifty per centum of the assessed valua-tion subject to the following conditions:
a. The owner or all of the
