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owners must file an application annually in the assessor's office at least ninety days before the day for filling the final assessment roll or such other time as may be hereafter fixed by law.

- b. The income of the owner or the combined income of the owners must not exceed \$3,000 for the twelve consecutive month prior to the date that the application is filed. Where title is vested in either the husband or wife, the combined income may not exceed such sum.
- c. Title to the property must be vested in the owner, or if more than one, in all the owners for at least sixty consecutive months prior to the date that the application is filed.
- d. The property must be used exclusively for residential purposes, be occupied in whole or in part by the owners, and constitute the legal residence of the owners.

Section 3. This Resolution shall take effect March 11, 1968.

Cancer Society To Conduct Health Survey

A Health Survey, to be conducted in 26 upstate counties by more than 7,500 volunteers of the American Cancer Society, New York State Division, will reach approximately 200,000 men and women it was announced by Dr. Ronald G. Vincent, chairman of the Divisions' Public Education Committee.

The Survey, to help the New York State Division plan its educational program, will be undertaken during the annual Cancer Crusade in April.

A confidential questionnaire to be filled out by the men and women called on, will cover questions on health tests and the health hazards of smoking.

"The American Cancer Society needs to know how many people understand these health tests, how many actually go to their physicians regularly, and the attitude of the public about smoking," Dr. Vincent said.

"Understanding these facts will help us plan our educational program better, so that the funds we raise during the Cancer Crusade will be spent the best way."

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Biggest Deer Take Recorded This Year In N. Y. State

More deer were taken in New York during the 1967 big game season than were ever before harvested in the State, according to an announcement by Conservation Commissioner R. Stewart Kilborne. The season total of 78,481 whitetails taken by gunners and archers topped their previous record of 73,693 set only last year. Included in this new record also is a record high of 51,215 adult bucks, exceeding the 1966 record of 43,875.

Not included in the overall statewide harvest figure were an additional 175 deer taken during the special post-season hunt on the Seneca Army Depot in Central New York.

"The record deer harvest again demonstrates the effectiveness of New York's deer management program, particularly the party permit system," Commissioner Kilborne explained. "By prudent harvest of antlerless deer along with adult bucks, the State's deer herd is balanced at the level which allows an abundant harvest each year without weakening the necessary breeding stock."

"An overabundance of deer does not mean, as some think, better hunting or easier kills. Rather, too many deer mean excessive agricultural damage and deterioration of winter range food supplies. This latter factor results in widespread starvation during a severe

winter because it produces many deer in weakened condition instead of the proper number of deer in good condition. New York's deer management program is designed to maintain deer population levels compatible with man's use of the land and the winter range food supplies," the Commissioner concluded.

Bear hunters in New York took 457 black bear during the 1967 season. This take has been exceeded in six of the past 10 years; the record being 648 bears taken in 1965. This season, Adirondack hunters harvested 376 bears and Catskill hunters took 73, near the average for the past 10 years. Central and Western hunters bagged only eight bruins, an all-time low.

A regional breakdown of the deer harvest indicates that Central and Western hunters harvested 30,226 deer, Catskill hunters bagged 27,578 deer and Adirondack nimrods took 20,677.

Record buck harvests were reported in 22 counties, 11 in Central and Western New York, seven in Catskills and four in the Adirondacks. Nine more counties either tied their previous adult buck take record or had the second highest take recorded.

A detailed, county-by-county summary of the big game season take will be ready shortly.
