Health Dept. Print To Fit Cracks Down On Stream Pollution

The State Health Department is ordered Guernsey Products c., in the Allegany County town Inc., in the Allegany County town of Cuba to stop dumping industrial waste into nearby waters and to construct pollution control facilities.

The company had been accused of polluting Oil Creek and an unnamed stream which flows into it. The firm waived a public hearing scheduled for Jan. 29 and signed a stipulation agreeing to terms of

a stipulation agreeing to terms of the order.

Under the order, the following timetable must be met:

— by Oct. 1, 1963, the company must stop discharging wastes into the waters unless it submits an engineering report and preliminary plans for a treatment facility by that date,

— by Aug. 1, 1969, it must submit final plans and specifications for the facility,

— by April 1, 1970, it must begin construction of the facility, and

by Nov. 1, 1970, it must fin-

— by Nov. 1, 1970, it must finish construction.

Upon completion of construction, put treatment plant into operation and keep in operation in such a manner as to continuously conform with the standards assigned to the receiving waters.

The order was announced today by State Health Commissioner Hollis S. Ingraham who added that

by State Health Commissioner Hollis S. Ingraham who added that any permits the company may have permiting such pollution are modified to conform with the timetable set forth in the order.

becoming a growing concern to the American people. Pollution and the lowering of the water tables are the most serious prob-lems confronting us.

Homes, farms, businesses and industry are the main general classifications for all water uses. classifications for all water uses. Human head for water for every man, woman and child in the United States is 44,000 gallons per year at a cost of \$18.25. On the farm 326,000 gallons are needed for one acre of alfalfa; 800,000 gallons for one acre of cotton. Water for cattle to produce milk is staggering. Paper mills, steel mills, irrigation and numerous other industrial needs baffle the imagination.

Every citizen must assume his fair share of responsibility in helping provide this water need and contribute to the development of new sources.
