### Is Your Social Security **Number Correct**

Income tax refunds of 3,171 taxpayers in the Buffalo District, who filed forms 1040 and 1040A without correct Social Security without correct Social Security numbers, are being held up in processing.

Even if the IRS is able to verify the correct number from Social Security Administration records, there is a delay in processing the refund, John E. Foley, District Director, Internal Revenue Service, Buffalo, said.

If the IRS has to contact the taxpayer to obtain a correct Social Security number which is vital in identifying the return for processing by computers, there is generally further delay, Mr. Foley

Other types of taxpayers errors are slowing IRS computer processing at the IRS Service Center in Andover, Massachusetts where Buffalo District returns are processed. Most of these errors occased to the service service the instructions and cur because the instructions sent to taxpayers with returns are not being followed.

Up to last week, he reported 3,349 returns ha dbeen filed without the necessary signatures. These will have to be sent back to the taxpayers before refunds can he processed.

Mistakes in arithmetic, another common cause for refund delay, so far total 4,957 and returns where taxpayers have used the wrong tax table total 10,976.

The IRS Service Center in Andover, Massachusetts had processed 446,513 refunds of Buffalo District taxpayers for a total of \$81,843,490.91, Mr. Foley said.
