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Attention -Construction Men

Petty Officer E. R. Little and R. D. McBride, Area Navy Recruiters, in Hornell, recently announced a greatly increased need for skilled construction men to fill the rank of the Navy's Seabees.

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Some 3,000 men are vitally needed before June 30th. Those qualifying will be enlisted in the Navy at advanced pay grades depending on the amount of experience they have in past civilian or military duties.

Some of the skills which are most vitally needed are Construct.

some or the skills which are most vitally needed are Construc-tion Equipment Operators, Con-struction electricians and build-ers. Almost all skills are covered in this new program, however:

Men enlisting for the Seabees, will not attend the normal "boot" training courses. Instead, they attend a 5 week school at Gulf-port, Mississippi, then ordered to Construction Battalions, where they receive further training before "shipping out."

Seabees are engaged today in

Seabees are engaged today in one of the largest construction programs in history in Viet Nam. The famous outfit, dating from WW II days, has the mottos "Can Do" and "We build, We fight."

Men with construction and related skills are asked to put these skills to work where they are vitally needed. The local Navy Recruiting Officers at 44 Canisteo St., Hornell has received all information on the program.

Ex-Servicemen are particularly welcome under this program. It offers them a chance to get back into service without taking a pay cut, in most cases. The advanced pay grades insure that most construction men will earn about as much in the Navv as they did in civilian life, sometimes more.

The age limit is up to 40 years old, but waivers can be obtained in the case of especially well qualified applicants.

Income Tax News Missing Signatures

Delivery of Federal income tax refunds to 6,612 taxnayers in the Buffalo District is being held up because the returns were filed without necessary signatures.

'Instead of refund checks, these taxpayers are getting their Forms 1040 or 1040A back to be signed', IRS District Director John E Foley for the Buffalo District has announced.

As a legal document a tax return must be signed to be valid and to permit the IRS to process

it and issue the refund, Mr. Foley said. Many missing signatures were those of wives required to sign joint returns he said.

Another major reason for delay of refund checks Mr. Foley said, is the neglect of taxpayers to include their correct Social Security number on tax returns.

number on tax returns.

Incorrect or missing Social Security numbers are delaying 6,096 refunds of Buffalo District tax-payers, he noted.

Mr. Foley reported that refunds also are being held up by other taxpayer errors or failures to comply with instructions that accompany tax returns.

Mistakes in arithmetic — causing delays in sending refunds — so far total 8,837, Mr. Foley said, adding that returns where the wrong tax table was used total 19,306.

The IRS Service Center in And over, Massachusetts as of last week had processed 621,444 re-funds to Buffalo District taxpayers for a total of \$115,032,551.49, Mr. Foley said.

Wellsville Firm Submits Bid

J. Burch McMorran, State Commissioner of Transportation, has announced receipt of a low bid of \$32,646 from Genesee Valley Nurseries Inc., Wellsville, N. Y. for screening of junkyard areas in the Town of Amity, Allegany-County, and the Town of Dansville, Steuben County, under the Highway Beautification Act. Two bids were received.

Trees and shrubs will be planted and eight-foot-tall chain link and wood screen fencing erected for about 1,3504-feet at the intersection of Route 19 and 408 in Amity, and for about 1,000 feet on Route 36 one and half miles north of the Village of Arkport in Dansville.

Scheduled for completion by December 4, 1968, all work will be under the supervision of William J. Dennis, District Engineer in charge of the Department's District Office at Hornell.
