

LIVING UNDER LAW

SPEECH OR THREATS

Freedom of speech enjoys its greatest protection in politics. The Constitution pro-

tects your right to sound off, to criticize the govern-ment or an official, even to

go to extremes based on poor information. Better to let ideas compete freely than to suppress them.

Political statements are often personal, but unless they are knowingly false or malicious, no official can sue for defamation. They are public property" so to speak, and fair game. But life cannot be hreatened.

In a recent case, Mike Madd telephoned the White House to complain about a speech of e had bought a gun and "I wrote a letter to the White House and told the President I would kill him." For that, the Secret Service arrested

When prosecuted, Mike said he didn't knowingly or wilfully mean to carry out his threat. Still the court convicted him. For conviction it

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is enough that the threatener comprehends the meaning of the threat and has an apparent determination to carry it out.

Free speech also has some limits. Obscene publications get the least protection even though it may be claimed that obscenity is part of free speech. The law requires a pamphleteer to identify himself or his publisher, but this law cannot be used to harass or limit free speech. The law can control loud and raucous noises, but complete banning of loud speakers and sound trucks violates freedom of

One has a right to hold a rally, parade, or a picket line, but subject to reasonable control. It cannot interfere with the general community's welfare. The law can regulate time, place and manner, but of expression.

Movies, books, magazines, and live plays come within free speech, even though the "message" may be trivial. sorship or regulation before publication unless it is ob-scene or presents a "clear and present danger" to the community.
