Carillonneur To Present Concert In Memory of Dr. Ray Wingate

Dr. Ray Wingate

James R. Lawson, carilloneur at the Riverside Church in New York City, will play a concert on the Davis Memorial Carillon, Sunday, April 28, in memory of the late Dr. Ray Wingate who was carillonneur at Alfred University for 30 years before his death last month.

The memorial concert will be presented a 4 p. m. on the Sunday which has been designated as International Carillon Day. The Laura Spelman Rockefeller Carillon of the River-Church contains 74 bells including the 20-ton Bourdon, which is the largest and heaviest tuned bell in the world.

Dr. Wingate was a guest carillonneur at the Riverside Church a number of times. During his career, he had played nearly 80 of the slightly more than 100 carillons in the western hemisphere. He had also played instruments in Belgium, Holland and France. Alfred University originally appointed Dr. Wingate to the faculty in 1912 as a professor of voice and organ. He became carillonneur when the Davis Memorial Carillon was elected on the campus in 1937.
