The Greenwood Central School opened its new swimming pool for the first time this past week.

The following will be the tentative schedule for use by adults and students in the School District.

Tuesday Night — 7:30 - 8:30 P. M. — Beginning Instruction for adult ladies.

Tuesday Night — 8:30 - 10:00 P. M. — Open Adult Swimming — All adults are invited.

Thursday Night — 7:30 - 9:30 P. M. — Family Night — Any adult is invited to come for either swimming or supervising their children or neighbors children. If children from outside the family are brought, please limit the total to 5.

Saturday Morning — Sponsored by the Town Youth Recreation Program — 9:00 - 10:30 A. M. — Students up through Grade 6.

Saturday Morning — 9:30 A. M. - 12:00 Noon — 7th Grade students and older.

At the first official opening last Saturday morning, under the Town Youth Recreation Program, there was 72 students that used the pool.

At the regular meeting of the Board of Education of the Greenwood Central School held on April 8 with all members present, the following business of general interest was acted upon.

A resolution was passed authorizing our school to cooperate in the bidding of bread products. This enables our school cafeteria to sell lunches at more reasonable prices.

It was decided by the Board that effective 1968 the probationary period for granting tenures to teachers would be changed from 3 to 5 years.

Requests for attendance at professional conferences were approved for Charity McCormick and Robert Kosciwicz. It was decided to conduct a

Summer School Program at the Greenwood Central School this summer along similar guide lines that were laid down for the program two years ago. Due to the construction program, it was impossible to conduct a local summer school program last year.

The new rules for the new swimming program were outlined and a charge of \$5.00 per hour was agreed upon for the use of the pool for outside groups. It was agreed to allow Boy Scouts the use of the pool free of charge with the understanding that they were to supply a certified and acceptable life guard.

The School Calendar, following closely to the Steuben County Calendar, for the 1968-69 school year was approved.

The use of the school facilities was approved by the Town Recreation Project for the 1968-69 year.

The annual Senior Trip, that was planned for this week-end, has been postponed and is tentatively rescheduled for the end of May.

Salaries for all non-teaching employees was discussed for the 1968-69 school year and it was agreed upon by action of the Board that the 1/60 plan for retirement to be offered to employees next year as soon as the laws of 1966 are extended.

The present cafeteria fee schedule for the use of the cafeteria by out of school groups will remain the same with an additional charge of \$1.65 an hour to cover the cost of cafeteria supervisor and assistance.

Proclamation

By The Governor

Governor Rockefeller has proclaimed April as "Cancer Control Month" to focus attention on the fight against a disease which he estimated will take the lives of 35,350 New York residents in 1968.

"Only a few years ago" the Governor said, "one cancer patient in four" was being saved." Today its one in three. This figure could be reduced to one in two with the tools and knowledge available right now."

Pointing to important cancer research being conducted in many New York State institutions and at the Roswell Park Memorial Institute in Buffalo, the Governor added:

"Much also is being accomplished in our State by dedicated and devoted medical scientists, physicians, voluntary health agencies, and public health departments to combat this disease.

"Knowledge of the 'Seven Warning signals of Cancer' popularized by the American Cancer Society can help save thousands of lives from cancer. The American Cancer Society also has produced leaflets that are being distributed to the people of our State, and is stepping up its research efforts in the search for causes and cures of cancer."

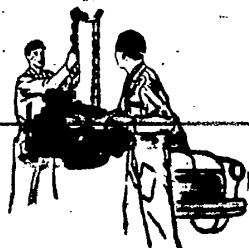
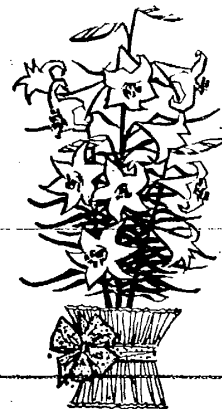
