Beware Of Grass Fires

Spring breezes usually are associated with pleasant thoughts— young boys flying kites and older "boys" watching girls. Unfortunately, spring breezes have their serious side as well. They dry out last year's grass and leaves and result in tinder-dry conditions all too suitable for the annual spring fire season.

The absence of snow cover in most areas of the state this year compounds the problem. The warm sun and brisk breezes dry exposed leaves and dead grasses very quickly. And, with the stiff breezes of the past few weeks, the drying out has been dangerously complete.

Although forest fires often are thought of as an autumn phenomenon — and the largest, most destructive forest fires do occur in the fall — there are more fires in the spring than in the fall. Most spring fires involve grass and brush, but can endanger woods, homes and human lives. The spring menace extends through April and May, greatly lessening about June with the appearance of the new season's grass and foliage.

The risk of spring fires now is heightened by the fact that the season coincides with spring clean-up time for farmers and homeowners as well as the start of the fishing season. Forest rangers, fire departments and volunteer firemen throughout the State are hard pressed to keep up with the rash of blazes, particularly on week-ends. The Conservation Department, therefore, advises anglers, farmers and housewives — as well as hikers, campers, woodsmen and everyone else out-of-doors — to remember the danger of the current fire season.

As a Department spokesman pointed out no matter how dry the leaves and grass become, it still takes a spark to start a fire. And unhappily, spring fire season or fall, nine out of ten fires result from some person's carelessness. Don't let it be you.
