Tree Seedlings Now For Sale

The New York State Conservation Department announces that tree seedlings are now being offered for sale on a "cash and carry" basis at the Oak Orchard Nursery.

Species available in units of one thousand are: white, red and Scotch pine, Norway and white spruce and larch. These trees are surplus stock and will be sold to eligible landowners for \$10.20 per thousand.

The Oak Orchard Nursery is 7 miles northwest of Oakfield in the East Shelby and Podunk Roads on the Genesee-Orleans County Line. Office hours are from 8 a. m. to 4:30 p. m. Monday through Saturday. The phone number of the nursery is Medina 798-1470.

Under state law the trees must be used for reforestation and can not be planted for landscaping or ornamental purposes. The trees may be cut for Christmas trees.

A Conservation Department Forester is stationed at the Oak Orchard Nursery. He may be consulted on the best species for your purpose and the most suitable for the planting site.

How To Adopt An "Official Map"

A new publication from the State Office of Planning Coordination tells how cities, towns and villages in New York State can adopt an "official map" to protect the rights-of-way for streets and drainage systems.

According to Charles T. Lanigan director of OPC, an official map gives additional support to the proposals in a municipality's comprehensive plan.

This device gives a municipality the opportunity to acquire land it needs and to prevent private building in the bed of proposed streets and other public developments.

The folder, entitled "The Official Map", tells how a legislative body adopts the map, which shows present and proposed facilities. Any change in the map must be approved by the legislative body, after recommendations by the planning board and a public hearing.

An official map also helps present and prospective property owners by showing the location of their property in relation to existing and proposed public facilities.

Lanigan said the publication is part of OPC's program of technical and financial assistance for local planning. The agency is responsible for coordinating federal, state, local and private planning that affects this state.
