How To Adopt An "Official Map"

"Official Map"

A new publication from the State Office of Planning Coordination tells how cities, towns and villages in New York State can adopt an "official map" to protect the rights-of-way for streets and drainage systems.

According to Charles T. Lanigan director of OPC, an official map gives additional support to the proposals in a municipality's comprehensive plan.

This device gives a municipality the opportunity to acquire land it needs and to prevent private building in the bed of proposed streets and other public developments.

The folder artitled "The Office of the content of the proposed streets and other public developments.

The folder, entitled "The Official Map", tells how a legislative body adopts the map, which shows present and proposed facilities. Any change in the map must be approved by the legislative body, after recommendations by the leaving beauty and applying heart planning board and a public hearAn official map also helps present and prospective property owners by showing the location of their property in relation to ex-isting and proposed public facil-

Lanigan said the publication is part of OPC's program of technical and finapcial assistance for local planning. The agency is responsible for coordinating federal, state, local and private planning that affects this state.
