#### Wellsville Airport Funds Win FAA Approval

Funds have been allocated by the Federal Aviation Agency towards the proposed new Airport for Wellsville.

Supervisor Wayne Feeman received a joint announcement from Senator Jacob Javits, Senator Pabert Wayned Congressmen

Supervisor wayne reeman received a joint announcement from Senator Jacob Javits, Senator Robert Kennedy and Congressman Charles E. Goodell that the FAA has allocated \$290,400 to the Wellsville Airport project.

"With the allocation of the federal fund, the Wellsville Town Board will press vigorously for approval of state funds" Supervisor Feeman said.

Board members had been assured last February by state officials that the town's application for \$256,762 from the state for the airport project would be included in the 1968-89 budget.

The next steps by the board include a series of public informational meetings and preliminary engineering survey on the 300-acres on Niles Hill, the proposed site of the new airport.

The Wellsville Tewn Board, with officials of local industries have been meeting with federal officials in Washington pressing for funds to re-locate the Wellsville Airport from its site on the Bolivar Road to a larger site in the town to enable airport facilities to be enlarged to accommodate the larger-type planes being used by business and industrial firms throughout the country.

Your Will



Even when the mother is named guardian, she's anything but a free agent in the handling of the child's money. She has to provide a bond; she's under constant supervision of the court; she must file a periodic accounting. It's an expensive and cumbersome procedure, that can be avoided by a properly drawn will.

immercanal standard

The impersonal standard form will is rarely an acceptable substitute for an individual will, prepared by a qualified attorney. If you need a lawyer, your banker can recommend several good ones.

An executor is an individual or corporate fiduciary (bank or trust company), you name in your will to settle your estate after you have gone. Choose your executor or executors carefully—not on the basis of friendship or relationship alone, but on the basis of competence and shilling to handle money mat-

If you die and leave no will, you are said to have died intestate. In effect the state in which you live makes your will. Your property is distributed in accordance with fixed provisions of the state law. No matter how small or large your estate, not leaving a will may cause much trouble and inconvenience for your survivors.

Take the job inadequately. If you name your wife as your executor (men die on the average of seven years before their wives), you may wish to name your local bank or trust company as sessions add up to \$18,000.

The young husband dies suddenly—leaving no will. Under New York State law, the widow receives only one-half of her husband's estate, while their only child gets an equal share. But since he is a minor, a guardian has to be appointed by the probate or surrogate's court. Even when the mother is named guardian, she's anything but a free agent in the handling of passed on It dies with you.

\*Your knowledge of the property you own and your advice as to its disposition cannot be passed on. It dies with you. \*You lose the privilege of naming your executor, and this may be a costly loss.

\*You lose the privilege, afforded by laws in most states, of naming a guardian for your minor children. This is vital, as timelarly if your wife should.

In some instances, if there is no immediate family, your failure to leave a will may result in the passage of your property to persons in whom you have no particular interest—or even in its "escheat" (transfer) to the state.

Settling your estate is likely to be more complicated and may prove more costly.

minimize estate and inheritance taxes. This can often be done by a planned will.
