State To Stock New Pheasants In Local Area

Conservation Commissioner R. Stewart Kilborne today announced news that will gladden the hearts of pheasant hunters across the State: Two additional strains of pheasants will be stocked in experimental numbers this week in New York State. The newcomers are the Korean Ringnecked and the Japanese Green.

Both birds are expected to thrive in cover which is not suitable for the familiar ringnecked pheasant. Approximately 1,400 Korean Ringnecked pheasants will be stocked in four locations in central and western counties and approximately 200 Japanese Green pheasants will be stocked in a single location in Sullivan County, west of Swan Lake. The Koreans will be planted in Allegany County, north of Angelica; in Cattaraugus County, east of Cattaraugus; in Chenango County, north of Bainbridge; and in Tioga County, north of Smithboro.

Equal numbers of cock and hen birds will be stocked in each site and every bird will be wearing a leg band. The areas in which the new birds will be stocked are brushier and of higher elevation than is best for the popular ringnecked pheasant. Of course, all of the stocked sites will be closed to pheasant hunting to give the new strains a good chance to establish themselves. Boundaries of the closed areas will be identified with appropriate signs.

Any birds which leave the posted areas, however, may be harvested by hunters. Conservation Department biologists urged that hunters bagging such strays return the bands with complete information as to location of kill so that dispersion patterns can be calculated.

Stocking is planned for the same areas for up to three consecutive years, depending on results of field investigations. Additional areas for stocking Japanese Green pheasants will be selected in future years when more birds are expected to be available.

The new game birds were reared at the Department's Game Farm near Delmar, Albany County, from eggs obtained in Korea and Japan. The Korean eggs were collected from the nests of wild birds, while the Japanese eggs were obtained from a Japanese game farm and were one generation removed from the wild state.

Friday, May 3rd, 7 - 9 for practice

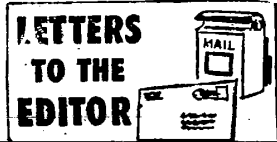
9 - 11 time trials for qualification for May 4th opener.

In each division, the 4 fastest times as determined on Friday, will qualify for the 4 respective 1st place positions in their respective feature event. A trophy will be given to the top time in each division as the historic marker in being the first fastest qualifier on the new asphalt surface.

This year the three classes of cars that will be running at both Holland and Perry are: New Car; Late Model Hobby; and Amateur. In the Late Models and Amateurs, engines with less than the allowed maximum cubic inch limit may be used provided a type of engine was available before 1962. Windshields are mandatory in late model hobbies in 1955 and newer amateurs. As far as the new cars and coupes are concerned, they MUST have a wire mesh or similar approved construction when no windshield used. This wire mesh or approved construction must be in the original place of the windshield regardless of whether Plexiglas is used. This is to maintain the outward appearance of a car with its natural contours.
