Whitesville Bank Held Up In Daring Daylight Robbery

The Whitesville branch of The Citizens National Bank and Trust Company was held up at 2:25 p. m. Tuesday afternoon in a daring daylight robbery that netted a take of \$1,300, according to bank

officials.

The Bandit entered the bank, handed Donald Kelley, assistant Cashier, who was on duty at the teller's window nearest the door, Cashier, who was on duty at meteller's window nearest the door, a note which read: "Don't panic. Give me \$750. No silver. Don't sound the alarm for five minutes. I need the money for my little girl's operation."

Cashier Kelley first handed the man a package of fifty \$1 bills, but when he demanded more, he given another package of

but when he demanded more, he was given another package of small bills amounting to \$1,250.

The bandit, described by officials, was about 35 years old, neadly dressed, wearing dark clothing, a cap, and sunglasses. After getting the money, he left the bank, entered a late model Mercury Cougar sedan with a green body and black vinvl top, and drove from Whitesville in a Westerly direction.

Andover Men Hurt In Auto Crash

Gary A. McCormick, 27, of 22
Maple St., and Bruce Harris, 22,
of 10 Second St., were hospitalized late Tuesday night as the
result of a bad 1-car accident on
the West side of Greenwood Hill,
just a few hundred yards East of
the Willard Hulse residence (the
former Lane Country School
House.)
The accident occurred around

The accident occurred around 11:30 p m. when Gary McCormick, owner and ovowed operator of the 1960 Plymouth Station Wagon, lost control as he was traveling West (towards Andover), verred off on the left side of the road, knocked down several reflector posts, dropped off the shoulder of the road hitting the abutment of a culvert running under the road, then, judging from the marks in the dirt, went end-over-end 3 times, making a complete turn and 12, and then came to rest with the back of the car part way up in a small tree and the front of the car pointing toward Andover—upside down.

According to Firemen from the Andover Rescue Squad who were called to the scene of the accident by "Tommy" Joyce, who was apparently, the first motorist on the scene, Mr. McCormick was found in the woods around 50 feet ahead of where the car findly came to test and was apparently in non-condition. After administering First Aid, both men were rushed to the Jone's Memorial Hosnital where it was removed that McCormick suffered a compound fracture of the left arm, fracture of the right leg, multiple contraines, lacerations, and abmisions.
