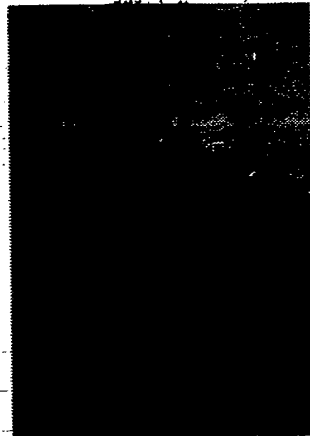

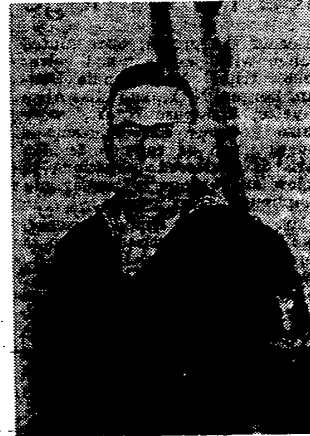

Greenwood Seabee Returns from Viet Nam

Navy Builder First Class Rodney Burley of Christian Hollow Rd., Greenwood recently completed a tour of duty with the Navy's Seabees in South Viet Nam and is currently spending thirty days leave at home with his family and friends. He has volunteered to return to Viet Nam and expects to do so in the near future.

A 47 year old grandfather, Petty Officer Burley answered the Navy's call to arms for construction men last June. He left his civilian job as manager of a construction supply company in Olean and enlisted in the Navy in Hornell with Petty Officers E. R. Little and R. D. McBride, area Navy recruiters. He was given the rank of First Class Petty Officer by virtue of his civilian experience in construction. He had last served on active duty with the U. S. Army in 1945.

Career Navyman Burley, who has been decorated sixteen times

by the United States and once by South Viet Nam, attended Escape, Evasion and Survival School shortly after re-enlisting and then was sent to Viet Nam with Mobile Construction Battalion 6. (MCB6) While in Viet Nam MCB6: killed forty-six Viet Cong; drove their equipment over a million miles; at 10,000 gallons of ice cream, 40 tons of meat, and 190,000 eggs; built, added to or improved 26 miles of road, housing for a battalion of Army troops, 2 hospitals, an electric power station, three oil storage tanks, a USO, an engine repair shop, a library for the USMC, some bridges, and numerous other projects.

Commended in writing by his Commanding Officer for a job well done, Builder Burley is married to the former Miss Cora Bassett also of Greenwood. They have three children and one grandchild.
