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English Conference

Mrs. Rosemary Burger was A. C. S.'s representative at the eighteenth Annual Conference of the New York State English Council held in New York City on April 25, 26 and 27. The theme stressed this year was, "Making English More Relevant to our Students."

Mrs. Burger attended a demonstration entitled "English with Impact" which dealt with ways to make the subject matter of English intertwine with the experiences of children. Secondary students from New York City, were used in this demonstration.

Following the demonstration, Mrs. Burger heard an excellent panel discuss "Language and Linguistics in the Secondary School." Speaking were Harvey Singer of Christopher Columbus High School, Bronx and Robert L. Allen Teachers' College, Columbia University.

The "Pros and Cons of Poetry" was the main idea in a discussion, led by Robert Berlin of New York University explaining why students like some poetry and dislike other poetry.

On Friday afternoon there was a workshop on "Composition and Unreality". The keynote speaker was Benjamin DeMott of Amherst College. Heated discussion followed Dr. DeMott's address as, in small workshops, teachers were generally unwilling to agree that students should write and write without correction of their work.

Other sessions were attended by Mrs. Burger including "Reading in the Secondary School", "Semantics in High School English: Language and Survival" and "Relevancy in Poetry". The meeting dealing with poetry was especially interesting since the main speaker was Stephen Dunning, the author of a book used by the eighth grade in our school. Mrs. Burger felt that this was a wonderful experience and found the information to be very useful in her teaching of the seventh, eighth and ninth grade English classes.

Reading Conference

Boston, Mass., was the location chosen for the 13th Annual Convention of the International Reading Association, held from Tuesday, April 24 to Saturday, April 27. The Conference was attended by more than 12,000 delegates and members of the organization, and participants came from as close as a few blocks from the War Memorial Auditorium and as far away as from Australia, Japan, Denmark and Israel to attend any number of the 200 sessions conducted. Among the participants were Mrs. Carlyle Carmody of Andover.

The activities of the conference included pre-convention institutes, daily general sessions, seminars and symposia meetings. Among the particular sessions attended by Mrs. Carmody were Identifying the Dyslexic, School Libraries, Remedial and Corrective Teachers, The Library's Role in the Reading Program, and Evaluating School Reading Programs. 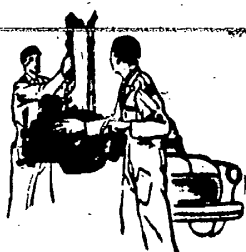
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
