completed two weeks of training under simulated combat conditions in the fundamentals of day and night patrolling, employment of infantry weapons, survival methods and assault tactics at Camp Lejeune, N. C.

This individual combat training is given every Marine after his graduation from recruit training. Taught by combat experienced non-commission officers of the infantry training regiment at Camp Lejeune, it prepares the young Leatherneck to become part of the Marine air-ground combat team.

While in the field he was taught how to use hand grenades, a compass, and the principles of map reading and land-navigation. He learned how to detect and disarm mines and booby traps and, while being exposed to live machine gun fire, he learned to advance safely from one point to another.

From this course, he is scheduled to go on to more advanced training before being assigned to his permanent unit.

Charles E. Goodell Candidate For Re-election

Representative Charles E. Goodell has officially announced his candidacy for re-election to the U.S. House of Representatives following the filing of petitions on his behalf with the Secretary of State in Albany. The Congressmen is the Republican nominee for re-election.

He represents the 38th Congressional District which includes Allegany, Schuyler, Steuben, Cattaraugus & Chautauqua Counties.

He was first elected to the House of Representatives in 1959 and will have completed nine years in the House this month. He successfully ran for re-election in 1960, 1962, 1964 and 1966. Representative Goodell is Chairman of the House Committee on Planning and Research, is a member of the formail leadership of the House and serves as a member of the Joint House — Senate Republican Leadership. He is a member of the Republican Coordinating Committee.

Having served for the Committee on Education and Labor since his first election, the Congressman is now the third ranking Republican on that active committee. Since his election to the House at the age of 33, he has proposed a number of legislative programs designed to return fiscal integrity to the government while offering effective assistance in meeting the needs of the Nation.

The Human Renewal Fund of 1969 would reduce the Fiscal year 1969 budget in specific areas by \$6.5 Billion. Of this amount \$2.5 Billion. would be fed back into top prierity programs to meet press-

ing national needs. More than 60 other members of the House have followed Representative Goodell's leadership in supporting this pro-

The Coalition to Help Malnour-The Coalition to Help Malnourished Americans, organized and
led by Republican Goodell, is an
unprecedented bipartisan plan dedicated to improving Federal programs to bring effective help to
hungry Americans.
