Notice Of Public Hearing

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that a Public Hearing will be held in the County Supervisors' room at the County Courthouse, Belmont, New York, on June 10, 1968 at 2:30 o'clock P. M., in connection with a proposed Local Law for the County of Allegany entitled "A Local Law Providing for the Reimbursement of Moving Expenses to certain County Employees."

The proposed Local Law provides for moving expenses incurred by all County Employees upon initial appointment or Supervisors specifically authorizing the payment of such expenses for each such County Employee. Moving expenses is defined to mean only the actual amount paid to a private or public carrier for the cost of transportation of the employee's household goods and furnishings provided that the distance traveled by such carrier from the point of departure to the point of destination in Allegany County exceeds fifty miles.

Such Local Law, if adopted, shall take effect upon the date filed in the Office of the Secretary of State.
