Goodell Announces Cash Grant To Corning Community College

Representative Charles E. Good-ell, has confirmed approval of a-399,787 grant to Corning Con-munity College, Corning, from the Appalachian Regional Commission.

The Congressman said the funds will be used for the construction of nurse training facilities at the college.
