Mesa Verde, Col. 5-18-68

Dear Mr. Allen:

Here we are nicely located at the Mesa Verde Nat. Park, high up in the mountains, where the temperature is 30 nights and 65-70 day times.

We left Florida in May 5th, coming through Ala., Miss., La., Texas and New Mexico. We were at Abilene State Park in Texas last week-end. Coming through New Mexico we spent one day at Albuquerque, sight seeing and shopping at old town.

Coming North from Gallup, we were in the Navajo Indian Reservation for 130 mi. This National Park of 52,073 acres was the home of the Pueblo Indians, who were supposed to have lived in this area for about 1300 years. They were cliff dwellers and built their homes on the cliff of a mountain top. The cliff over hangs and makes a roof over their village.

They are supposed to have lived here till about 400 years ago, and nobody knows why they left or where they went to. The best theory is they went South and mingled with the Navajo tribes.

The roads in the park (20 mi.) are very mountainous, up switchbacks, thru a tunnel and around curves. Gretchen was very scared of the mountain roads and in fact coming down yesterday she had her head under her wing all the way down.

We plan to leave here Monday A. M. and will go South West to the only point in the U.S. where 4 States meet at a common point, and from there on to the Flagstaff, Ariz. area.

Goodell Announces Cash Grant To Corning Community College

Representative Charles E. Goodell has confirmed approval of a \$99,787 grant to Corning Community College, Corning, from the Appalachian Regional Commission.

The Congressman said the funds will be used for the construction of nurse training facilities at the college.

He said it will allow the college to expand to educate an increased number of licensed practical nurses. The college presently has facilities for 50 new student nurses annually. The Congressman said the new construction will permit the college to admit 100 students annually.

In addition to the Appalachian grant \$374,059 will come from the Public Health Service, \$124,344 from the State of New York and \$71,752 from local sources

Rural Carriers To Distribute Livestock Survey Cards

The Rural Carriers, Roland Kemp and John Cannon, are distributing this week to some of their patrons, LIVESTOCK SURVEY Cards and Letters to be filled out by the farmers and returned to the carriers no later than June 1st. The information developed by these surveys is made available to farmers to help in planning future production and in marketing current supplies. A joint Federal-State project, the survey seeks information on cattle and milk cows, and on number of calves and pigs born this past winter and spring. Information on chickens and egg production is also asked.

A week during May is designated when patrons on rural, city motorized and box delivery star routes are encouraged to examine, and improve where necessary, the appearance of their mailboxes, to see they are conveniently located and safe to protect their mail from the weather. This is the week to do so and if you have a problem about your box ask your rural carrier for any suggestions.
