This system seems to have worked out very well in the past, and we see no sense in expanding the County budget by \$60,000 to provide for a Sheriff's Patrol of Deputies to improve police coverage — particularly in the sparsely populated northen townships of the county.

We have talked to Undersheriff Burdick and find that he is a strong believer in continuing the

Burdick and find that he is a strong believer in continuing the present type of operation and leaving the State Police and local Police Forces to take care of the police coverage.

Thus we feel that everyone who I nus we feel that everyone who is interested in keeping County Taxes as low as possible, could help themselves by supporting Undersheriff Richard Burdeik in the Republican Primary on June 18th.



H. "Monty" Bloss Retires After 50 Yrs. Bank Service

A much - respected Allegany County banker who began his career on July 1, 1918 at the age of 19 at the First National Bank of Whitesville, and went on to become President and Director of the Citizens National Bank of Wellsville, has announced his retirement, effective June 30, at which time he will have completed a full 50 years in banking.

Harold L. Bloss joined the staff

Harold L. Bloss joined the staff of the Whitesville bank in 1918, and at the age of 21 was named Assistant Cashier, and in 1922 became Cashier and Director of the First National Bank of Whitesville, a post he retained until July 1, 1930, when he accepted the post of Cashier of the First Na-tional Bank of Ripley, N. Y.

tional Bank of Ripley, N. Y.

Upon the closing of the Ripley bank in the summer of 1971, Mr. Bloss returned to Whitesville as Cashier, Executive Vice President and Director in September of 1931. He retained this post until the March 1959 merger of the Whitesville bank with the Citteens National Bank of Wellsville, at which time he became Vice President and Director of the Wellsville Bank. In January, 1961, Mr. Bloss was

In January, 1961, Mr Bloss was named President and Juneator of the Citizens National Bank of Walleylie the Citize Wellsville.
