Daytona Firecracker 400

The birthday present I'd like to have this year is one that no one can give me. It's one that I'll have to give myself.

It's worth more than \$15,000. My tastes aren't really that expensive but the present I'm talking about is victory in the Firecracker 400 which is run at Daytona International Speedway on July 4

just two days after my birth-

just two days after my birthday.

I've been coming to the Firecracker since 1959, but my celebrations have always been two days too soon. This time I want to celebrate in Victory Lane. My record in the Firecracker is a sorry one. I have raced in its seven times and I think my average finish works out at close to 19th.

I can't blame the track because

I can't blame the track because I can't blame the track because I like Daytona and have won two Daytona 500's there. I seem to go 500 miles a lot better than I do 400. My hard luck seems to hit me at the Firecracker, for I usually race all right coming up to it, and after it, but never during it

it.

The Firecracker isn't an easy race to win It's a flat out race from the start to the finish, and that's tough on the drivers and the cars. The heat is a major factor, too. It wears out both men and machines. And there's no strategy in the Firecracker. Not for me, anyway. I just push my foot down and keep it there all the time. A man can play it a little cool in the 500, but not in the Firecracker. If you try to play it careful, some fellow who keeps the button pushed all the

play it careful, some fellow who keeps the button pushed all the way will last and take the money.

Last year, you may remember, I like to have never to started. I had to come in on the pace lap and change all my spark plugs, and then had to come right back in and change the carburetion.

I lost lots of laps and never was really in contention, though I did manage to finish fifth. In a race as fast and competitive as the Firecracker a few seconds is almost impossible to make up, and this places a whale of a burden on the pit crews. They must get their cars out in next to nothing flat or they can cost their men the race.

I am pretty sure that the qualifying times for the Firecracker won't be quite as fast as they were for the 500. For two reasons, one being the new (and to my mind, wise) change in the rules on the tires. Now a man has to start the race on the same tires he on the tires. Now a man has to start the race on the same tires he used to qualify, and that will eliminate the special ones we have used for qualifying, and which wouldn't last more than a few

used for qualifying, and which wouldn't last more than a few laps.

I think the tire rule was a wise one on NASCAR's part. It will provide a much truer picture of the speed of the cars. The car that wins the pole should really be the fastest, and not just the fastest on a special set of tires. Also, it will help the mechanics in that they will have to set up a car just cnce. With special qualifying tires, the mechanics had to set it up twice, and sometimes they didn't have time to make all the necessary changes. This will make for a better race. And doing away with special tires for qualifying will help the owners and drivers who are working on a tight budget. It gives them a better chance.

chance.

I could be wrong, but my guess is that the top qualifying speeds for the Firecracker 400 will be two or three miles slower than the ones for the 500 in February when Cale Yarborough his 189.222 mi per hour. I feel that 186 to 187 will take the pole in July. The change in the tire rule will cut the speed a trifle, and so will the heat. In July, the sun is really hot, and the engines won't produce quite as well. But you can't really tell. Some one may break the 190 barrier. the 190 barrier.
