Does YOUR SCHOOL BOARD NEED WATCHING?

At the risk of being called "Dear Abby", this column is entitled: Advice to School Board Members. In my experience with school board members, I find that most of the foolish moves they make are due primarily to lack of knowledge rather than lack of integrity, but that doesn't make it any easier for the taxpayer.

Remember schools are for teaching. Those who want to handle sociological problems in our schools are sending us down the wrong path. If you teach a child to read, he will be able to handle problems. If you teach him to handle today's problems, tomorrow's problems may baffle him.

Study the Education Law as much as possible. Practice economy. Our students may grow a little stronger if everything isn't handed them on a silver platter. Students and parents must be made to understand that each community has health and safety problems, pollution problems, problems of the aged, employment problems, housing problems, and crime. There is more to living than providing a formal education.

Accept opposition. Criticism is healthy. Criticism must be met squarely, not with name-calling. Work with teachers as well as administrators in educational pursuits. A situation with too many administrators, too well paid, at one end produces poor teachers (academically and financially) at the other end.

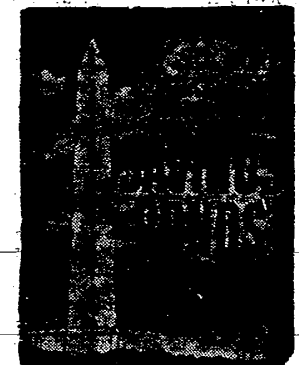
Never, never use any of the following type of phrases: "The children will suffer," "Leave it to

the experts" or "I don't know." These are signs of weakness. Expect administrators to prove their worth as much as possible. Otherwise don't accept them. After all, education isn't just being awarded. It's a search for a different kind of facts each year.

School Board Candidates. Districts will be putting up school board candidates soon. This is the "advice" for school board candidates:

- 1. Don't accept a nomination for the school board unless you want to be on the board and you can do the job. Each school board member should have an education background, and keep a file on what is going on locally, statewide and nationwide in the field of education. The public cannot afford school board members who take the job for prestige reasons. 2. Don't believe you are not getting involved. Many people with limited formal education have common sense and wit which can outshine the experts. Many senior citizens would have much to offer a school district from their variety of experiences in life. 3. Don't run for the school board, as many do, because you have children in the school. This is a selfish motive. Your sights must be far wider than that. There is a universal interest in education and even people without children can be important board members.

If a school district has board members who adhere to most of the above suggestions, that school district is lucky. If not the school district elections coming up should be the most important ever.
