At the risk of being called "Deir Abby", this column is suited. Advice to School Board Members. In my experience with school board members, it find that most of the follish mives they make side within the most of the follish mives they make side within the part of knowledge rather than lack of integrity, but that doesn't make it any easier for the taxpayer Perhaps some of the ideas put forth here, will help make our school board members more alert to school problems. I summit that school board members should:

Talk to the people in the entire

...Talk to the people in the entire district, not just to the people who have children in school. The lat-ter are naturally biased. School boards suffer from lack of commun ications because they rely on use-less little newsletters or an ad-ministrator to do the public rela-tions job. The best public rela-tions come from the school board member who respects his consti-

tuency.

Remember schools are for teach-Remember schools are for teaching. Those who want to handle sociological problems in our schools are sending us down the wrong path. If you teach a child to read, he will be able to handle problems. If you teach him to handle today's problems, tomorrow's problems may baffle him. There is nothing wrong with basic education. It may not be glamorous, but it has a life-time guarantee. School board members have the duty to set the philosophy of education. They have a duty to check on the academic progress being made in our schools.

Study the Education Law as much as possible.

Practice economy. Our students may grow a little stronger if everything isn't handed them on a silver platter. Students and parents must be made to understand that each community has health and safety problems. pollution problems.


