Wednesday night he met the Board at the Dump on the Andover Hill. In order to keep the Town Dump open it became necessary to make some new rules. All garbage must be kept separate from bottles and cans. Paper must also be kept separate. All wood and metal must be kept separate into piles at the dump. There can be no burning at the dump, but papers can be burned in burning cans in the back yards. Garbage must be covered daily.

It becomes necessary to change the days that the dump will be open to Friday and Saturday. The hours are the same 8:00 A. M. - 5:00 P. M. The Board asks co-operation so we can keep the dump open. If we do not comply the State Health Department will force the Town to close the dump. Lloyd Fletcher is hired to be at the Dump when it is open.

Mr. and Mrs. Edward Halsey and family left Monday for a week's camping trip on Seneca Lake.

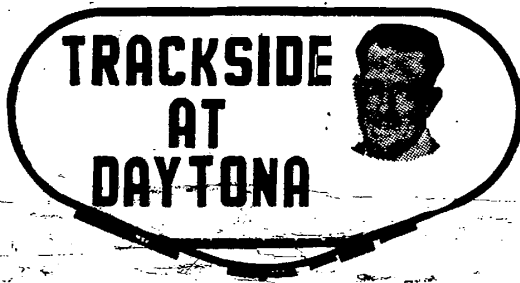
Lynn Redmond of Ithaca spent the week-end with his parents Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Redmond.

The Firecracker 400 rolls around again on July 4th at Daytona International Speedway and it is one I always think of with mixed emotions.

This race gave me my biggest thrill and, confusing as it may sound, also my biggest disappointment.

My biggest thrill in racing was leading the 1964 race and getting the white flag showing only one more lap to go. And my biggest disappointment was when A. J. Foyt got by me on the last lap and won the Firecracker.

The difference between first and second place was about \$6,000 but besides the money, the win meant a lot. A big race like this one carries a lot of prestige, and it's a hard thing to lead up to the last lap and then finish second. Still, it's a lot better than finishing third.

The Firecracker 400 is always a good race to win and maybe even more so this year. I'm running all the NASCAR events with my eye on the Grand National Championship and I don't think the competition has ever been tougher.

It used to be you had to worry about beating one or two cars on a short track but now there's never less than five real tough ones that will be fighting for the lead at any race.

And at Daytona you always have more competition than any place else. There will probably be 15 or more cars in the Firecracker trying to lead, and even more than that capable of winning.

I feel if you're in the racing business, you ought to race. That's why we're running them all.

And right now, the Firecracker 400 is a big goal in our plans.
