News That's Print To Fit

Well folks, here is a story of two candidates:

S. Thomas Sutton, Republican Candidate for Governor of the State of Illinois has said: "Upon my election as Governor of Illinois, I pledge to introduce Legislation in the First Session of the Illinois State Legislature of 1969 FOR THE REPEAL of all restrictive gun laws against responsible citizens, home owners, and businessmen; and throughout my term of office I shall stand for strong enforcement of law and order and the prevention of riots.

Compare this with what our own Governor has attempted! On Friday, March 8, 1968, Governor Nelson A. Rockefeller unveiled his long awaited gun control bill and introduced it into the Rules Committee of the N. Y. State Senate. The ultra-restrictive measure, which has been described by many to be a "blueprint for a police state", has been assigned Senate Bill No. S-5269 and was forwarded to Senator Speno's Codes Committee. The bill would create a 7-member Firearms Control Bill and the statewide licensing authority would be the superintendent of State Police.

Persons possessing shoulder guns after September 1, 1969, would be required to obtain a license. Licenses to possess a hand gun prior to November 1, 1968 would continue in effect until their expiration date, or in the case of indefinite licenses, until September 1, 1969.

The bill also provides for seizure of firearms from a citizens residence. It would permit an appointed official to direct police to seize firearms in a citizen's home if the official believes he has "reasonable grounds for the seizure." The Rockefeller Gun Law would require citizens to apply for a license to possess handguns and the authorization would have to be endorsed for each hand gun possessed, while a single license would be required to possess shoulder guns.

Registration fees for hand guns would be \$5 for the original license and \$2 for each subsequent endorsement covering any new hand guns. A fee of \$3 would be required for shoulder guns.

Now we ask all of you: "How can a law like this even be condoned when the second Amendment under the Bill of Rights states — 'the right of the people to keep and bear arms shall not be infringed'?"

The freedom to possess a weapon for defense of home and state is no less important than the freedoms of speech, press, religion, assembly and petition guaranteed by the First Amendment!

Well Folks, now to get back to our own 4th of July Celebration, we noticed that the Celebration Signs have been put on on each end of Main Street and find that this was done by the Parade Committee with fees donated by the Fire Department.

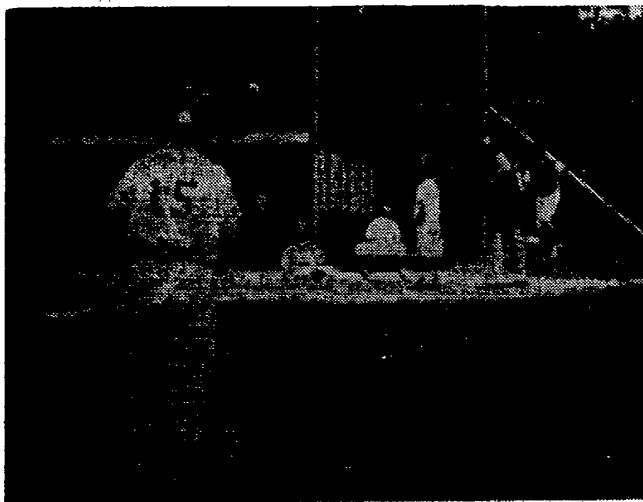
Then too, we noticed that there are 11 trophies in the window of the Andover branch of the Citizens National Bank and Trust Co. and find that these will be awarded to: the 1st three places in the float contest; 1st 2 places for Firemen in the parade; 1st 2 places of Firemen's Auxiliaries; 1st 2 places for Special Entries; and the 1st 2 places for Musical Organizations.

In addition to this, in Kenny Vars' store window, the Firemen's prizes are on display. The trophies to be awarded are for the winners of Water Fights; Tug-of-War; Hose Laying; Bucket Brigade; and the Women's Auxiliary Water Fight. The Big Trophy for the 4th of July water fights has to be won 3 times by a Fire Company for permanent possession, but they do not have to be in consecutive years.
