"For meritorius service during the TET Offensive of February and March 1968 while attached to the U. S. Naval Support Activity at Dang Ha and Cua Viet, Republic of Vietnam, and serving as a crew member of the LCM-8-917. During the TET Offensive, the U. S. Naval Support Activity Detachment at Dang Ha and Cua Viet was engaged in the vital and hazardous mission of supplying United States Army and Marine Corps Units which were engaged in hitter fighting in the northeast area of the I Corps Tactical Zone. This mission required the transportation of supplies from Cua Viet to Dong Ha, a distance of eight miles on the Cua Viet River. Seaman COMMON was assigned as a crew member of the LCM-8-917, one of the craft which was tasked with hauling these supplies. The LCM-8-917 was required to make at least two trips each day in the terh of heavy small arms, artillery, recoilless rifle, rocket propelled crenade, and mortar fire from Viet Cong and North Vietnamese Army Units which were firmly entrenched along the banks of the Cua Viet River.
