High School graduates who complete the Army's Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps or National Defense Cadet Corps programs and college men with two or more years of ROTC training can nowenter the Army as privates, E-2, according to Army recruiter Sgt. Thomas E. Buehler.

The Director of ROTC/NDCC, U.S. Continental Army Command, said that those who qualify will automatically become E-2s whether they voluntarily enlist or are High School graduates who com-

automatically become E-2s whether they voluntarily enlist or are inducted into the Army. Young men enrolled in similar Navy and Air Force-sponsored ROTC programs will also be allowed to enter the Army as privates E-2. The new soldiers who receive private stripes for their ROTC training must still take basic combat training.

The Army Junior ROTC program, conducted at 511 high school, and the NDCC program, conducted at 37 schools, are de-signed to teach the students good citizenship, self reliance, leader-ship, loyalty and discipline. These schools conduct an elective or re-quired three-or four-year ROTC training course. Participation in the Army Junior ROTC program does not obligate students for fu-ture military service.

Pure Water Construction Grant Approved

Governor Rockefeller announced today approval of a \$5^1.820 Pure Waters construction grant to the Town of Caneadea in Allegany County for a new secondary sew-age treatment plant to help abate pollution of Houghton Creek and

pollution of Houghton Creek and the Genesee River.

"This project, with a total eligible cost of \$869,200, will serve the Houghton area within the Town of Caneadea," Governor Rockefeller said. "Included in the area are Houghton College. Houghton Academy, Cuba Specialties Manufacturing Company, and residential and light commercial development.

"The new secondary treatment plan will use the trickling filter method of treatment. Related interceptors are included. The design flow is 28,00 persons. The average design flow is 28,000 gallons a day.

"The State grant of \$501.820 represents 57-73 per cent of the eligible cost, including \$241,060 or 27.73 per cent prefinancing of the federal share."

Because of inadequate Congressional appropriations for water pollution control, the federal grant will be only \$19.700, representing 2.27 per cent of the eligible cost."

Governor Shafer Awards Contract To Dr. John K. Fisher

Governor Raymond Shafer re-cently awarded a contract to Dr. John K. Fisher Professor of Fsych-ology at Edinboro State College, John K. Fisher Professor of Fsychology at Edinboro State College, to conduct a study for the Pennsylvania Science and Engineering Foundation. The Study is concerned with the identification of science and engineering needs in the six counties of Northwestern Pennsylvania. Dr. Fisher is directing this study which is being conducted by a Consortium of colleges in that region. Colleges cooperating in this effort include: Allegheny College, Behrend Camp - The Pennsylvania State University, Edinboro State College, Gannon College, Mercyhurst College and Villa Marie College.

The study is being conducted this summer with the final report due in September, 1968. It is expected that this report will recommend actions to the Foundation that would strengthen science and engineering in Northwestern Pennsylvania.
