**Urgent Need Is Cited For Added Counselors In Two-Year Colleges**

Two-year college students, perhaps more than students in other institutions of higher learning, seem to have considerable difficulty in sticking with their line of study.

This is the finding of Prof. Dalva E. Hedlund in a report just released which attempts to evaluate counseling and related services in New York State two-year colleges.

The evaluation was presented at a two-day Cornell University - State Education Department Student Personnel Conference at the N. Y. State College of Agriculture's department of education.

The study found that frequent curriculum changes by students in the two-year schools often related directly to inadequate academic and educational counseling.

That more full-time counselors were needed was of serious concern. It was reported that inappropriate career advice, unrealistic self-appraisal, little knowledge of courses to be taken, or simply inadequate guidance apparently is adding to the high student loss rate.

Other reasons included lack of goals or no real commitment to learning which was attributed to lack of counseling or parental pressure to major in "prestige" programs.

Inappropriate curriculum choice due to students often choosing a field they were not happy or suited for was another factor cited in the student's inactivity to round out his two year training.

Hedlund said it was difficult to define accurately all the reasons for student failures due to the great diversity between the various colleges across the state.

The study, which was financed by a grant from the N. Y. State Department of Education, was aimed primarily at students, faculty members and counselors.

"It is probable," Hedlund said, "that many students' problems could be alleviated by adequate counseling and better student personnel services."
